CHAIRPERSON LINDSAY:

Good afternoon. Welcome to the Economic Development Committee meeting. If we could all please rise for the Pledge of Allegiance led by Legislator Trotta.

(Salutation)

CHAIRPERSON LINDSAY:

Good afternoon. Welcome to the Economic Development Committee meeting. For the record, if you could just note that Legislators McCaffrey and Stern have excused absences. Madam Clerk, we don't have any public comment cards?

MS. ELLIS:

No, sir.

CHAIRPERSON LINDSAY:

If there's anybody here from the public that would like to speak during the public portion, please come forward. Not seeing anyone, we'll close the public portion and move right into introductory resolutions.

INTRODUCTORY RESOLUTIONS

Introductory Resolution 1269. Designating Poet Laureate for Suffolk County (Gladys L. Henderson). (Lindsay). Hi, Gladys, if you wouldn't mind just coming forward. Thank you for coming. Good afternoon, Ms. Henderson, thank you for coming before the Committee today.

MS. HENDERSON:

Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON LINDSAY:

I just -- if you wouldn't mind just telling us a little bit about your work in poetry. We have some sample poems that you've written and what this, I guess, would mean to you to be the Poet Laureate for the County.

MS. HENDERSON:

Well, as you know, my name is Gladys Henderson, and it's my honor and my pleasure to have been selected by the Committee of the past poet laureates as their candidate for the Suffolk County Poet Laureate for the years 2017 and 2019. I've written poetry since I was nine years old, and it's always been my sister giving me comfort and helping me to move forward during very difficult times. For me, poetry is an art form that creates a common family, one that spiritually connects us to each other regardless of perhaps our faith position. It becomes our language. It dissolves

1 differences, and it heals. It is a healing art.

3 Many of my poems are about nature and have been inspired by my life
4 here on Long Island. I come from a very diverse background. There
5 were farmers, there were fishermen, there were teachers, there were
6 people who worked in the fields. So, for me, part of my life was
7 working next to my brother because he was 12 years my senior. So,
8 a lot of my work was helping him clam, helping him do the work that
9 he did during the summer when he was not teaching, as well as my
10 own life here.

11
12 Many -- the members of my family have been literally on this island
13 for a very, very long time. I only recently have heard of the
14 history that I had quite by accident. Telling somebody that I had
15 no idea of anything about my family, this person was a poet and a
16 historian. His name was Robert Harrison, and, you know, give a
17 person that type of opportunity he'll find something about your
18 family, and he found my family tree, and what's wonderful about it
19 is that he's writing a book of poetry about the poets on Long
20 Island, and he said to me, *You, Gladys, have two poets that you're*
21 *related to on the island.* And I said *Who are they?* And he said
22 *Bloodgood Cutter from Great Neck* - who was called the former poet,
23 and if you're interested he was also called the poet laureate by
24 Samuel Clemens. You might be interested in just looking that up --
25 why, not to be talked about here, but it's funny - *and Benjamin*
26 *Field* who was called the Babylon bard, and he was right in Babylon.
27 So, that's something that came to me quite by accident and quite
28 certainly by the work of poetry that somebody who was a poet and a
29 historian actually found my family or my family tree. Many of
30 those names, I have no idea who they are. So, it ended with
31 cousins. You know, that was it. Grandparents, that was about it.

33 So, I thank you so much for inviting me, and I cannot tell you how
34 excited I am for the opportunity to serve our community, Suffolk
35 County and not just the poets but those people who might be
36 interested in poetry regardless of what their interest is.

38 **CHAIRPERSON LINDSAY:**

39 Thank you. Legislator Hahn.

40
41 **LEGISLATOR HAHN:**

42 Thank you very much for your willingness to serve in this capacity
43 and for your love of the written word and of our Suffolk County and
44 Long Island and all it has to offer. How do you propose to expand
45 the reach of the poet laureate if at all and to reach out to
46 children and others who may not yet have found a love for poetry
47 the way you have?

48
49 **MS. HENDERSON:**

50 Well, you know, I think a lot of that has to do with the
51 opportunity for it to exist in the communities and in libraries and
52 for there to be not only just poetry readings, which there are
53 poetry readings. I'm currently holding two poetry readings a
54 month, and I also have a workshop that I run also. It's important
55 for workshops to introduce to the community to be free, and I think
56 it's important in addition to that to look towards the youth of our

1 island because there are poets who are out there. So, certainly
2 one of the endeavors that I'll be looking at will be looking how we
3 can get -- really cultivate the younger children into the world of
4 poetry, how we can introduce them. I was the poetry judge for the
5 Walt Whitman Birthplace for the children's segment for years. It's
6 -- there's fabulous poetry out there. And so, that's really the
7 goal in front of me, is how will I, how will we do that, how will
8 we make it fun, how will you make -- how will we make that fun for
9 children so it's more than just a moment. You know, maybe it would
10 be a whole day of -- maybe it would be a day of poetry that would
11 have children reading and adults reading, all our Long Island
12 people reading. Maybe it will be at the gazebo and maybe in
13 Nesconset.

14
15 **LEGISLATOR HAHN:**

16 Maybe in our parks.

17
18 **MS. HENDERSON:**

19 Yeah.

20
21 **LEGISLATOR HAHN:**

22 Because I'm Chair of the Parks Committee, and we are about to
23 launch and announce a Parks passport that I've established, that
24 this Legislature passed a number of years ago, but -- that we've,
25 you know, completed and will have -- it's for kids, and we have a
26 pilot for, you know, my district, but there may be something --
27 poems and, you know, poems of our parks and have children -- and
28 ask children to write -- come to the park, write something about,
29 you know, a poem about their favorite park and, you know, there may
30 be a way to just connect our parks and poetry, and the alliteration
31 is good to, but --

32
33 **MS. HENDERSON:**

34 Absolutely. It would be a wonderful moment, and, you know, we're
35 looking for great places for -- for safe places, great places for
36 families to hang out and be with each other as family. You know, I
37 can't think of a better way to have a day and --

38
39 **LEGISLATOR HAHN:**

40 So, could we partner with you to hold workshops, you know, for kids
41 around poetry writing? Is that something --

42
43 **MS. HENDERSON:**

44 Why not?

45
46 **LEGISLATOR HAHN:**

47 Okay.

48
49 **MS. HENDERSON:**

50 Absolutely.

51
52 **LEGISLATOR HAHN:**

53 Yeah. I would be interested if you are. Thank you.

54
55 **MS. HENDERSON:**

56 No problem.

1 **CHAIRPERSON LINDSAY:**

2 Well, thank you again, Ms. Henderson, for your willingness to
3 partake in this role, and if you spend any amount of time within
4 this chamber it might change some of the poetry that you write
5 based on what you hear here.

6
7 **MS. HENDERSON:**

8 (Laughter.)
9

10 **CHAIRPERSON LINDSAY:**

11 Some of the debate that goes back and forth. But seriously, thank
12 you very much for your willingness to do this.

13
14 **MS. HENDERSON:**

15 Appreciate it.
16

17 **CHAIRPERSON LINDSAY:**

18 And we could all use a little bit more poetry in our lives. So,
19 thank you. Madam Clerk, do we have a motion? Okay, I'll make a
20 motion to approve.

21
22 **LEGISLATOR HAHN:**

23 Second.
24

25 **CHAIRPERSON LINDSAY:**

26 Second by Legislator Hahn. All those in favor? Opposed?
27 Abstentions? **The motion carries. (Vote: 3-0-0-2. Legislators**
28 **McCaffrey and Stern not present.)**

29
30 Congratulations. This will go before the full Legislature on
31 Tuesday. You don't need to appear. You're more than welcome to
32 come.
33

34 **MS. HENDERSON:**

35 Okay.
36

37 **CHAIRPERSON LINDSAY:**

38 And there's no need for you to be there if you -- it's not
39 necessary if you don't want to come down, but --
40

41 **MS. HENDERSON:**

42 Didn't send a photograph or anything to put my chair on.
43

44 **CHAIRPERSON LINDSAY:**

45 We will distribute samples of your poems that we have though --

47 **MS. HENDERSON:**

48 I would appreciate that.
49

50 **CHAIRPERSON LINDSAY:**

51 -- to the full Legislature.

53 **MS. HENDERSON:**

54 Thank you.

22 Introductory Resolution 1270. To reappoint Patricia Snyder as a
23 member of the Suffolk County Citizens Advisory Board for the Arts.
24 (Krupski). I'll make a motion.

26 LEGISLATOR HAHN:

27 Second.

29 CHAIRPERSON LINDSAY:

30 Second by Legislator Hahn. All those in favor? Opposed?
31 Abstentions. The motion carries (Vote: 3-0-0-2. Legislators
32 McCaffrey and Stern not present.)
