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THE MEETING WAS CALLED TO ORDER AT 12:35 PM

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4 **CHAIRPERSON MARTINEZ:**

5 Good afternoon and welcome to today's Education & Human Services
6 Committee. If we could all rise for the Pledge of Allegiance to be
7 led by Legislator Calarco.
8

9 **SALUTATION**

10
11 Thank you. Okay and welcome. We have not received any
12 correspondence. Do we have any cards, Madam Clerk?
13

14 **MS. ELLIS:**

15 No, ma'am.
16

17 **CHAIRPERSON MARTINEZ:**

18 Thank you. Anyone in the audience who would like to address the
19 Committee? Seeing none for the record as well.
20

21 **PRESENTATIONS**

22
23 We will continue with our agenda. And that's our presentation.
24 Today we have Suffolk County Hispanic Advisory Board here, our
25 recording secretary Victor Ayala. Good morning, Mr. Ayala.
26

27 **MR. AYALA:**

28 Good morning.
29

30 **CHAIRPERSON MARTINEZ:**

31 Or good afternoon. So it's my understanding as part of the
32 Hispanic Advisory Board you are to present to the Committee your
33 annual report; correct?
34

35 **MR. AYALA:**

36 That's correct.
37

38 **CHAIRPERSON MARTINEZ:**

39 And this is what you're going to be doing today. Okay, perfect.
40 Thank you.
41

42 **MR. AYALA:**

43 Okay, I'd like to begin by thanking you, Legislator Monica
44 Martinez, for having us speak before this group. I also wanted the
45 Committee to know that our Chair, Miss Betty DeSabato has had a
46 family emergency and, therefore, she's not able to attend. I'd
47 also like to acknowledge fellow board members Alex Lima, Betty
48 DeSabato, Vannessa Espanal, Pilar Moya, Maria Figalora, Lisset
49 Guerrero, Carlos Ramos and Luis Solano. We also at this point
50 would like to thank the Office of Minority Affairs Reverend Pearson
51 and Grace Ioannidis.
52

53 So I will begin with my report. Okay. Initially the Suffolk
54 County Advisory Board was created to discuss issues of importance
55 and relevance of the Hispanic community and to make recommendations
56 regarding proposed legislation to the Suffolk County Legislature

1 and to the Suffolk County Executive in connection with the
2 following: To advocate for the needs of the Hispanic community in
3 terms of social advancement, economic development, educational
4 opportunity and access to health services; to encourage civic
5 participation at all levels of government by members of the
6 Hispanic community; and also to promote Hispanic business
7 development and to provide information necessary for Hispanic
8 businesses to enable them to have equal access and opportunity to
9 contracting and procurement in Suffolk County; and to strengthen
10 the cultural exchange between the Hispanic community, Suffolk
11 County government and Suffolk County residents.

13 In 2016 we met with the Suffolk County Executive, Mr. Bellone, to
14 review the mission and goals of the Suffolk County Hispanic
15 Advisory Board. County Executive Bellone encouraged the board to
16 meet with the service providers of Suffolk County. In an effort to
17 advocate for Hispanic community, it was important to understand the
18 services provided to them by the County. Interviews with the
19 representatives of these departments provided detail information
20 about the services available to various communities of Suffolk
21 County.

23 These are the organizations that we interviewed. I would say that
24 for the most part the representatives expressed that it was -- I'm
25 sorry, I'm a little ahead of myself. Our interviews with the
26 representatives of these departments provided detail information
27 about the services available to the various communities of Suffolk
28 County. All representatives provided information on their services
29 and described the mission of their respective departments. The
30 Suffolk County Hispanic Advisory Board members were impressed with
31 the array of information and services as well as the
32 representatives' commitment to reach out to the Hispanic community.
33 So these are the organizations that we interviewed.

35 Our findings -- basically after meeting with all of the
36 representatives from these various organizations, many of the
37 representatives expressed that it was difficult to reach the
38 Hispanic community because of language barriers. They indicated
39 that infiltrating the community was difficult. It was stated that
40 there needed to be more opportunities to reach out to the Hispanic
41 community. Presenters during these interviews expressed that at
42 times individuals of the Hispanic community were not -- would not
43 avail themselves to the services for lack of trust and/or fear of
44 interacting with unknown individuals from governmental local
45 agencies who did not speak their language. Also of significance is
46 currently the national climate for undocumented individuals.

48 I'm not going to go through each section in terms of our
49 interaction and interviews with the Office of Minority Health. I
50 think you have the report. The Suffolk County Office of the Aging,
51 we met with the Commissioner Tim Sini of the Suffolk County Police
52 Department; and we also met with Veterans Affairs, Women's Services
53 and the Department of Labor. And they, too, provided an inordinate
54 amount of information regarding their services.

56 Again, each of the department representatives were enthusiastic and

1 committed to providing detail information of their services.
2 However, we felt that there remains a disconnect with how this
3 information is communicated to the Hispanic community of Suffolk
4 County. And the Hispanic Advisory Board members that were present,
5 some of those individuals did not know of some of the services that
6 were being provided.

7
8 So at this point I'd like to just make -- these are some of our
9 recommendations: The Suffolk County Hispanic Advisory Board, we
10 want to continue to engage in meaningful dialogue with the Suffolk
11 County service agencies. The Suffolk County Hispanic Advisory
12 Board, we'd like to meet with the County Executive at least twice a
13 year so that we can understand some of the political direction and
14 priorities and policies set by the leadership so that we can foster
15 greater synergy as is it relates to addressing the needs of the
16 Hispanic community.

17
18 The Suffolk County Hispanic Advisory Board we want to continue our
19 working relationship with the Commissioner -- the Police
20 Commissioner so that we can meet at least twice a year to continue
21 our partnership and dialogue that will assist the community with
22 his goals of reducing crime and strengthening community relations.

23
24 And last year it was -- I thought a great opportunity for the
25 Hispanic Advisory Board group to meet with Commissioner Sini to
26 better understand some of the related issues in terms of crime as
27 it impacts the Hispanic community. And we thought that that was an
28 excellent opportunity. And then at that meeting we felt that it
29 was important that we work together so that we could provide the
30 Hispanic community with information as it relates to community
31 policing and to further develop trust between the Police Department
32 and the community.

33
34 We also felt that other strategies should be considered in
35 providing outreach to the Hispanic community. When we speak about
36 the strategies, we kind of felt that the current strategy and
37 outreaching the Hispanic community is not an effective one. We
38 felt that there really needs to be more work as it relates to
39 either recruiting bilingual speakers or engaging the Hispanic
40 community as it relates to the services. We thought -- and we do
41 know that this does occur in terms of providing or sponsoring
42 conferences within community colleges around various topics,
43 whether it be crime, whether it be youth gang violence, whether it
44 be educational opportunities, but we felt that there needed to be
45 more outreach to the Hispanic community. Wait a minute.

46
47 And the last thing we felt that the Advisory Board them self could
48 attend more activities in the community and just provide more
49 support and representation for the Hispanic community.

50
51 The last item as it relates to recommendations, we felt very strong
52 that there needs to be data collection of Hispanic access to County
53 services; and that this data hopefully would speak to the outcomes
54 that are occurring within the Hispanic community vis a vis these
55 services.

1 And then the last recommendation that I'm adding at this point that
2 it may be possible to survey members of the Hispanic community
3 themselves to better understand how they perceive the services that
4 are being offered.

5
6 And I think that concludes my report. And I thank you very much
7 for offering us this opportunity to present our work this past
8 year.

9
10 **CHAIRPERSON MARTINEZ:**

11 Thank you, Mr. Ayala. We do have a couple of questions from
12 members of the Committee.

13
14 **MR. AYALA:**

15 Sure.

16
17 **CHAIRPERSON MARTINEZ:**

18 Legislator Kennedy.

19
20 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

21 Thank you for your presentation. I just want to clarify for you
22 that there should never, ever be any political thoughts, wishes,
23 agenda for any of the communities that we as a government take care
24 of. So leave that one on the way side. There never should be.

25
26 **MR. AYALA:**

27 Did you feel that I was indicating that there was?

28
29 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

12:46PM 30 You made a comment about political climate or something like that.
31 And I just want to clarify for you, no, you should never feel that
32 there's a political climate other than the immigration if that's
33 what you're speaking over. And on that, I don't know if any of us
34 can be comfortable making it more able to be understood. Because
35 at this point I know that I don't understand what's going on.

36
37 **MR. AYALA:**

38 Well, Legislator Kennedy, I'm not implying that, you know, we need
39 to focus on those political ramifications --

42 Okay.

43
44 **MR. AYALA:**

45 -- that impact our community. What I am suggesting is that our
46 community really needs to -- in order to be more a part of what's
47 happening, have a better understanding, you know, it was our
48 experience that there's a disconnect. And all we want is for that
49 information to get back to the Hispanic community.

52 That I understand.

53
54 **MR. AYALA:**

55 Okay.

1 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

2 Thank you.

3
4 **CHAIRPERSON MARTINEZ:**

5 Okay, Legislator Barraga.

6
7 **LEG. BARRAGA:**

8 Thank you for the report. Let me ask you a couple of questions.
9 One of your recommendations is to meet with the Commissioner of
10 Police twice a year. When you meet with him, is the plan to not
11 only listen to his goals and objectives but to present suggestions
12 or recommendations that you may feel would be more appropriate and
13 make him more effective as the Commissioner of Police in dealing
14 with Hispanic issues?

15
16 **MR. AYALA:**

17 Yes, I will say to you that our meeting with Commissioner Sini was
18 incredible in that we felt it was an opportunity to build trust; we
19 felt it was an opportunity to better understand some of the new
20 initiatives as it relates to community policing; we felt it was a
21 greater opportunity to work with him as it relates to preventing
22 crime in our community. So we -- we also felt it was important to
23 do data sharing so that our community would be informed as to some
24 of the crimes happening in our own community. So we really felt
25 that it was an excellent meeting so that we can partner with him to
26 work with him and to support those initiatives.

27
28 **LEG. BARRAGA:**

29 Is there a certain individual in the police department, like you're
30 meeting with the Commissioner twice a year, is there another
31 high-ranking officer or chief or deputy chief or inspector of
32 Hispanic heritage who you could meet with once a month or once
33 every quarter?

34
35 **MR. AYALA:**

36 I don't know that but we would welcome any --

37
38 **LEG. BARRAGA:**

39 In your meeting with the Commissioner, was it just one on one or
40 were there other officers present?

41
42 **MR. AYALA:**

43 There was, I think, a special assistant and our --

44
45 **LEG. BARRAGA:**

46 Are any of those officers Hispanic?

47
48 **MR. AYALA:**

49 No.

50
51 **LEG. BARRAGA:**

52 Okay. All right. I think that's an issue that maybe Sini or the
53 future Commissioner has to take a look at because there's a
54 dramatic demographic change in Suffolk County in terms of the
55 growth of the Hispanic community. It would seem to me that, you
56 know, meeting with him twice a year is fine, but I would think that

1 you would also want to meet with some high-ranking Hispanic police
2 official on a monthly or quarterly basis so that there's this
3 constant input back and forth between the police department and
4 your group.

5
6 **MR. AYALA:**

7 I would just like to indicate that about two years ago the Hispanic
8 Advisory Board was very engaged in evaluating the exam that
9 potential police officers take in order to be members of the force.
10 And I think that's how we started to kind of work this relationship
11 together. So I do agree with you the importance of meeting
12 possibly Hispanic members of the force, but, you know, I think for
13 us we're really very interested in the dialogue and the
14 working-together.

15
16 **LEG. BARRAGA:**

17 Yeah, because I -- you know, all of us are very concerned about,
18 you know, what's happening with gangs and MS-13.

19
20 **MR. AYALA:**

21 Absolutely.

22
23 **LEG. BARRAGA:**

24 And certainly the Advisory Board, I'm sure you're very concerned
25 about it. And that dialogue has to be constant and continuous and
26 frequent; and very frequent. And it'd be wise if at some point in
27 the time in the future maybe the Commissioner can send his
28 appointee, someone of a higher rank who's Hispanic to deal with
29 these issues.

30
31 **MR. AYALA:**

32 Yes, I agree.

33
34 **LEG. BARRAGA:**

35 All right, thank you.

36
37 **CHAIRPERSON MARTINEZ:**

38 Thank you, Legislator Barraga. We also have questions from
39 Legislator Browning.

40
41 **LEG. BROWNING:**

42 You know, I'd like to kind of go back to the political climate, you
43 know, coming from Ireland, there are a lot of undocumented Irish
44 here, also. However --

45
46 **LEG. BARRAGA:**

47 Really?

48
49 **LEG. BROWNING:**

50 I've heard. Absolutely. (Laughter) I met quite a few of them.
51 But, you know -- and the issue for them is, you know, when we talk
52 about the political climate, obviously the media, there's a lot
53 being said on the media. And sometimes the tone is not necessarily
54 good when it talks to undocumented immigrants.

55
56 So are you seeing an increase of people reaching out to you? And

1 I'd kind of like to get an idea of -- because I know when they talk
2 about the immigration issue and the PD, you know, Police
3 Department, one of their concerns was is now people kind of going
4 under the radar, being afraid to report, being afraid to come
5 forward. So I'm kind of curious how the Hispanic Advisory Board
6 has done. I mean, I know I have a lot of Hispanic members in my
7 community, in my district. I think we -- because of the -- our
8 population's over 10%, I think; you have to have at least 10% to
9 have somebody on the board. But as far as reaching out to the
10 various communities, are you -- have you done more to reach out
11 because of that fear that has been occurring with people? And has
12 there been an increase also of people coming to the board, reaching
13 out to somebody through the board because of worries?

15 **MR. AYALA:**

16 I think for the past two years, you know, as a member of the
17 Hispanic Advisory Board, we've worked very hard to really try to
18 foster an environment where we can engage and interact with the
19 Police Department; and also bring to the table some of the concerns
20 that we have heard as individual advisory board members. Even
21 though we see ads on TV, which speak to, you know -- *it doesn't*
22 *matter your immigration status, you can come forward, you can trust*
23 *the police.* We still hear that members of our community are very
24 fearful. And it's not just immigration status. I think also it
25 had to do with the crimes that were occurring within specific
26 areas. They were just really fearful of the environment that they
27 were living in. And so, I think, that there's got to be a better
28 way to communicate and engage members of this community because
29 they have a lot of information as to what's happening in their own
30 community. So the feeling that, you know, if I come forward, what
31 will happen to me, I think, that's very significant on some level.

33 **LEG. BROWNING:**

34 Has that caused an increase of people reaching out to you?
35

36 **MR. AYALA:**

37 Yeah, we've had -- in terms of the other members, they've had
38 people reaching out to them so.
39

40 **LEG. BROWNING:**

41 No. I mean in all honestly I mean I was at an event and there were
42 some Irish people there who told that they're not legally in the
43 country; and, you know, working hard every day, paying taxes; and,
44 you know, that some of them have children who were born here, just
45 the same as the Hispanic community. And, you know, they expressed
46 concerns also about, you know, the immigration issue. And they see
47 an impact on them also that -- you know, I know it seems that
48 there's always that image that they're just Hispanic people, but
49 it's not. It's Hispanic, it's Muslim, it's, you know, it's many
50 nationalities.
51

53 Right.

55 **LEG. BROWNING:**

56 So, you know, I do have some concerns about -- I mean, we just saw

1 a horrific event this past few days ago with two young women, and
2 two people trying to defend them who are no longer here. So that's
3 a scary point. It seems to be raising an awful lot of hatred and
4 -- so I'm glad to hear that you're getting an increase. I'm
5 hoping that somewhere along the line -- and I understand having
6 spoken with Monica, you know, with the MS-13 fear of retaliation if
7 they do come forward, but I'm hoping that we can have that -- you
8 know, we've had a good relationship with the Police Department with
9 the immigrant community but I'm hoping that, you know, it's not --
10 it's not going to fall away and people are not going to come
11 forward.

13 **MR. AYALA:**

14 I think one of the comments that were made by Commissioner Sini
15 was, he says -- he says he spoke about inserting police into the
16 life of young people. He felt it could provide other opportunities
17 to improve the relationship between children and the police. And I
18 really thought that was very significant. An incredible move; very
19 progressive thinking.

22 Thank you.

23
24 **MR. AYALA:**

25 Thank you.

26
27 **CHAIRPERSON MARTINEZ:**

28 Thank you. And, Mr. Ayala, I just want to say thank you. I know
29 that the board has done their due diligence in making sure that
30 they're speaking to different departments. And representing a
31 large immigrant community, I can attest to the fact that people do
32 have that fear, all right, people do come to my office on a regular
33 basis with that fear, with that disconnect to certain services that
34 are being provided within the County, which is one of the reasons
35 why I brought a resource center into my district where we had a
36 Department of Social Services and we have the Department of Health,
37 Department of Labor come in; and the Human Rights Commission
38 sometimes comes in based on appointment because of the fear that
39 individuals have in going to either offices in Hauppauge, in
40 Riverhead, Deer Park wherever it may be that they have to go.

42 So that's something that the County Executive and I proposed when I
43 first started, just to bring those services to our community
44 because of that fear. And with the policing and the community
45 relationship and fostering that relationship, I believe, is so
46 important. And even though at times it may get that backlash, but
47 it's important to make sure that our community is able to confide
48 in our police. And I'm very glad to hear that our Commissioner
49 would like to see more PD involved in our children's lives because
50 we do have school resource officers in our schools. But as this
51 Legislature has recommended to the Commissioner is that we need to
52 see more of them in our schools.

54 And, you know, it's nice because we used to have an SRO that all
55 the kids know. I mean even now they're twenty-something years old
56 and they knew who Officer Ross was because he was in those schools

1 advising them, guiding them, playing with them and making them feel
2 that, you know, like he is here and if you need something, you can
3 go to him.

4
5 So I think it's very important that we do foster those
6 relationships. And I do appreciate what you have been doing and
7 the board. What I would really like to see are concrete and
8 tangible strategies that you are discussing to see what each
9 department is trying to do to alleviate those concerns. Whatever
10 you need from me, please know that you have my full corporation.
11 And I do believe that you need to meet not just with the County
12 Executive or the Police Commissioner, but us, the electeds, who can
13 also provide those services and guidance to our members in our
14 community that we represent.

15
16 **MR. AYALA:**

17 Yes. We welcome that opportunity.

18
19 **CHAIRPERSON MARTINEZ:**

20 You know, I just spoke for all my colleagues, but, you know, each
21 one of them has a different percentage of immigrants in our
22 communities, whether Hispanic, Russian, Irish, whatever it may be.
23 Immigration is a comprehensive thing, not just one individual place
24 of origin. So I thank you for coming today. And please know that
25 anything you need, just reach out. And I look forward to hearing
26 of future things that you and the board are doing.

27
28 **MR. AYALA:**

29 Thank you for this opportunity. And one more time I really just
30 wanted to thank the Office of Minority Affairs because through
31 their guidance we've really worked collaboratively and it's been a
32 really good -- very productive. Thank you.

33
34 **CHAIRPERSON MARTINEZ:**

35 That's the only way we're going to make things happen, is working
36 together, right?

37
38 **MR. AYALA:**

39 Absolutely. Thank you.

40
41 **CHAIRPERSON MARTINEZ:**

42 Have a great day. Okay, continuing with our agenda, we don't have
43 any Tabled Resolutions. We do have an Introductory Resolution. Is
44 our Commissioner here of DSS? He is not here. Okay.

45
46 **INTRODUCTORY RESOLUTIONS**

47
48 So Introductory Resolution number 1383, **Accepting and appropriating**
49 **100% New York State pass-through Legislative Grant Funds from the**
50 **NYS Office of Children and Family Services in the amount of \$10,000**
51 **for the Suffolk County Police and Youth Academy administered by the**
52 **Suffolk County Youth Bureau and to execute grant related**
53 **agreements. (Co. Exec.)** I'd like to make a motion to approve.

54
55 **LEG. BARRAGA:**

56 Second.

CHAIRPERSON MARTINEZ:

Second by Legislator Barraga; and to be placed on the Consent Calendar. All in favor? Opposed? Abstention? Motion carries. (VOTE: 6-0-0-0. PLACED ON CONSENT CALENDAR).
