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(\*The meeting was called to order at 12:31 p.m.\*)

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2  
3 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

4 We are going to get started on the Parks and Recreation Committee.  
5 We are going to begin with the Pledge of Allegiance led by  
6 Legislator McCaffrey.

7  
8 **Salutation**  
9

10 Okay. Welcome. I am a new Chair of this committee. I'm very  
11 excited to work with my colleagues and we are going to begin with  
12 the Public Portion. We have one card that's been filled out, John  
13 Fry. Yes, if you could come up to the podium there and just make  
14 sure the green light is on the microphone. It should be on, and  
15 then you will have three minutes.

16  
17 **MR. FRY:**

18 Yup. I've been here before.

19  
20 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

21 Thank you.

22  
23 **MR. FRY:**

24 Yeah, I'm back again. I'm here really to talk about the recent  
25 price increase, and excuse my voice. I'm just getting over this  
26 cold. But those of us who are on the Park Camping I guess mailing  
27 list got a nice letter from the Commissioner announcing that there  
28 was going to be a change in the fee structure, and it was all  
29 really good, including a reduction in the base fee. But when you  
30 plug it in for those of us who camp on the outer beach, it's a huge  
31 increase, especially for seniors because it's adding what they call  
32 tier one and premium site fees. They almost double the cost of  
33 camping to seniors.

34  
35 So I made a copy, I think you all have it, but basically if you go  
36 back two years ago you could camp five nights at Shinnecock or at  
37 Montauk or Cupsogue or the outer beach at Smith Point for \$57  
38 counting the reservation fee. This year it will be \$105. So we're  
39 really putting the cost of this increase on the people who are on  
40 fixed incomes. Anecdotally I'd say more than half of the people  
41 who camp there are either seniors or volunteer firemen or veterans  
42 who enjoy the 50% discount, but with the new fee structure the  
43 discount only applies to the so-called base fee. So any way you  
44 cut it, it takes the cost up by, depending on whether you count the  
45 reservation fee or not, anywhere from 65 to 90% for the cost of  
46 camping. And, again, this is on the population of, you know,  
47 voters, taxpayers who, you know, can least afford to absorb the  
48 cost.

49  
50 And it also bears, I think, noting that for the outer beaches, I  
51 mean, these are the parks that receive the least services. There  
52 are no hook-ups, there are no picnic tables, there are no fire  
53 rings, there's no level pads. And that's not a push to add those  
54 things, by the way. We're there for the beach. But it seems like  
55 a really out of line increase in these days where the cost of  
56 living is barely moving at all and hasn't moved but .3% over the

1 last couple of years, and here's the park nearly doubling the cost  
2 to camp. I figured up for Shinnecock East alone the added revenue  
3 is going to be \$90,000. What's that going to?  
4

5 So I would ask, you know, what is this -- why was this structural  
6 change implemented, what problem does it fix and why are they doing  
7 it? And, again, I've been here before and there always seems to be  
8 when the park changes policy there's apparently no place for public  
9 input. So most government agencies, if they're going to make a  
10 change, they post the notice of the proposed change, there's  
11 hearings, they get input from the public, but with the Park  
12 Commission it doesn't seem like that ever happens. So I would  
13 highly suggest if they feel they have to raise the prices they roll  
14 it back and implement it step wise, and at least reinstate the  
15 senior and the volunteer firemen and veterans discount to the full  
16 50% instead of just for the base fee.  
17

18 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

19 Okay, thank you.  
20

21 **MR. FRY:**

22 Thank you.  
23

24 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

25 That was the only card I had today. Is there anyone else in the  
26 audience who would like to speak? Seeing none, we will close the  
27 Public Portion. I know that we have the Commissioner here. I  
28 don't know if you want to, you know, come forward in case anyone  
29 has any questions for you. You can have a seat at the table. I  
30 don't know if you usually do that. Does anybody have any questions  
31 for the Commissioner today? Legislator Lindsay.  
32

33 **LEG. LINDSAY:**

34 Just to the gentleman that was just up and speaking, Mr. Fry. I  
35 believe we had a public hearing on the fees before we passed the  
36 legislation. So before we pass any legislation, Mr. Fry, we do  
37 have a public hearing and there was a public hearing about the park  
38 fee increases that we had in 2016 calendar year for this year.  
39

40 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

41 So also did it go through the Parks Trustees?  
42

43 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

44 Correct, yes.  
45

46 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

47 Can you speak to how we'll use the -- I mean, we know we are way  
48 underfunded in our parks. Maybe you could speak to the necessity  
49 for having the additional revenue. It is incredibly important that  
50 we are able to maintain our parks. You probably read in the paper  
51 or saw on the news, you know, there have been some issues with  
52 vandalism and dumping in parks and we certainly need -- and  
53 obviously ongoing maintenance issues in many parks, I know Smith  
54 Point being one of them. Maybe if you could speak a little bit to  
55 the need for the revenue.  
56

1 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

2 Well, obviously we do understand that it is, you know, an increase  
3 in some fees to some residents and, you know, we're not trying to  
4 break the backs of everybody. And for people that camp there we  
5 are trying to make it a nicer park. I'm hoping that the additional  
6 fees that this does bring in that we can put them back into our  
7 parks and make them nicer. I know there have been a lot of issues  
8 and we've been getting a lot of stings daily on our Parks e-mail  
9 address about concerns, whether the bathrooms, you know, the  
10 cleanliness, garbage pick up and these things will be addressed.

12 I'm hoping that, you know, with the increase we can either get  
13 better quality staff or, you know, a higher -- instead of just a  
14 park attendant maybe bring other people in who can supervise our  
15 part-time staff a little bit better. I'm hoping also to increase  
16 the amount of Park Rangers that we have currently with this  
17 additional revenue that it could possibly bring in, and these are  
18 the ways that I'm looking slowly to implement some slow changes in  
19 the parks. I don't think that right away, next year, that  
20 everybody's going to see a great, great increase, but I am looking  
21 at it and I am very well aware of how this does affect other people  
22 and I'm trying to, through this, make the parks a little bit  
23 better. That's my intentions.

25 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

26 Do you also have ways for campers to submit suggestions at  
27 Shinnecock East and at, you know, our campsites?

28  
29 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

30 Everything -- I think it's SuffolkCountyParks@SuffolkCountyny.gov  
31 is our e-mail address, correct, that can go in?

33 **MS. BEEDENBENDER:**

34 The e-mail address is SCParks@SuffolkCountyny.gov and all campers  
35 receive a comment card when they check out that they can make  
36 suggestions and there's actually a list of questions on the back  
37 that they can submit as well.

38  
39 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

40 Because, Mr. Fry, you know, obviously if we're saying hook-ups I  
41 know that's an extremely expensive undertaking, but level  
42 campsites, picnic tables. I don't know about fire rings, if  
43 there's, you know, some places it's probably allowed, some places  
44 it's not. Some of these sound like easy additions that maybe we  
45 can consider. Legislator McCaffrey.

47 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

48 Commissioner, I know we did have that public hearing and I was  
49 concerned about making sure that our fees were in line with what  
50 the facilities were and you showed me they were. If you go on the  
51 -- Hither Hills, which is a State campground out in -- which is  
52 similar to where there are no hook-ups, there is no electric or  
53 anything, that's \$35 a night for a site there which is still less  
54 than what we're charging for a similar, you know, in a similar  
55 location. It starts at 35.

1 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

2 It's a little bit below, and we didn't raise all our fees. There  
3 are fees that we looked at that we didn't increase, you know, our  
4 parking fees, golf fees. And I do apologize that maybe it seems  
5 like we're targeting the campers, but we're not. We're just trying  
6 to bring everything up to a level where we feel is even with the  
7 rest of our surroundings.

8  
9 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

10 Also weren't there some that you were decreasing in order to up  
11 attendance?  
12

13 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

14 Yeah. There are two parks, which is Sears Bellows and Cathedral  
15 Pines, that the price, the base price went down because it doesn't  
16 have the facilities that the rest of our parks do with the  
17 amenities as far as sewer and electric hook-up. So that price did  
18 decrease, and we're hoping that more people will utilize these  
19 underutilized parks.

20  
21 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

22 Okay. Thank you. Anyone else have any questions for the  
23 Commissioner? Okay. We will move on to the agenda.  
24

25 **Tabled Resolutions**

26  
27 ***1953-16 - Directing the Department of Parks, Recreation and***  
28 ***Conservation to address illegal dumping in County Parks (Presiding***  
29 ***Officer)***. I'll make a motion to approve.

30  
31 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

32 Second.  
33

34 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

35 Second by Legislator Kennedy for the purposes of discussion. On  
36 the motion, Legislator Kennedy.  
37

38 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

39 Good afternoon.  
40

41 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

42 Good afternoon.  
43

44 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

45 I just want to go through a couple of questions. Publication will  
46 be done via e-mail or are we using the Forever stamp that went up  
47 two cents?  
48

49 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

50 This is the tabled resolution?  
51

52 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

53 Yes, this is the tabled resolution -- Presiding Officer Gregory's  
54 resolution to survey the parks and it has been amended.  
55  
56

1 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**  
2 And set up a hotline. There was nothing in there. Legislator Hahn  
3 -- her bill --

4  
5 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**  
6 Is next.

7  
8 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**  
9 -- calls for that.

11 **LEG. KENNEDY:**  
12 Oh, your bill's next. Okay.

13  
14 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**  
15 So this one refers to a -- it was amended recently. Maybe, George,  
16 if you could just give a brief description. Thank you.

17  
18 **MR. NOLAN:**  
19 The resolution was amended earlier this week I believe or late last  
12:42PM 20 week. It requires the department to conduct a survey of County  
21 parks, which have low or sporadic attendance but are accessible by  
22 motor vehicles, for indications that illegal dumping has occurred.  
23 It requires the department to issue a report to the Legislature and  
24 the County Executive of their findings within 120 days, and then  
25 directs the department to establish a procedure by telephone,  
26 e-mail and/or social media where residents can report suspected  
27 illegal dumping on County parkland and the department will make the  
28 public aware of this procedure by its website and other additional  
29 news media.

31 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**  
32 Through the website.

33  
34 **LEG. KENNEDY:**  
35 Thank you. I knew I wasn't losing my mind.

36  
37 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**  
38 Legislator Lindsay.

39  
40 **LEG. LINDSAY:**  
41 Commissioner, have we looked at using technology in some of these  
42 locations that are habitual, where it seems like they're  
43 continuously dumping and putting some kind of remote cameras to try  
44 and catch the offenders in the act?

45  
46 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**  
47 It could happen. It's costly and it wouldn't be live. A lot of  
48 these remote locations, there's no way to get out any kind of a  
12:44PM 49 wifi signal that we'd be able to watch it live so it would be after  
50 the fact, but there's a possibility that we could put in cameras  
51 and then if we do see the dumping go back and look at the video, so  
52 to speak.

53  
54 **LEG. LINDSAY:**  
55 And is it, you know, in the instances that we've seen, is it park  
56 that's spread out, has egress or ingress that are spread out, or is

1 there one way in, one way out, where if we just put something that  
2 caught everybody coming in, coming out.

3  
4 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

5 Every park is different. You know, obviously this is from the West  
6 Hills and that was, you know, I'm hoping an isolated problem that  
7 we had so far, I mean, through our other parks. We haven't done a  
8 full survey of every acre, but we haven't located any other illegal  
9 dumping other than the possibility of the neighbors throwing  
10 clippings over or branches, which I'm sure once we get in there I  
11 doubt there's one neighbor that hasn't done that.

12  
13 **LEG. LINDSAY:**

14 It seems to be an issue that's Countywide. I was just dealing with  
15 a community that has a dead end and people habitually go there to  
16 dump all kinds of things.

17  
18 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

19 And that isn't, I mean, obviously as egregious as the toxics, you  
20 know.

21  
22 **LEG. LINDSAY:**

23 Right.

24  
25 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

26 And/or graffiti, things like that, that are really what this bill  
27 is, I think, both of these are looking to address.

28  
29 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

30 I think that there's no question that there's a spectrum of  
31 dumping, it's all bad, it's all wrong.

32  
33 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

34 Absolutely.

35  
36 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

37 We want to end it all, you know, whether it's the neighbor that  
38 dumps their clippings that could spread invasive species into our  
39 parks, whether it's the mattress or the tire at the dead end, up on  
40 a park. That clearly, you know, tires contain toxic substances and  
41 need to be specially disposed of and there's no question that  
42 that's a problem, to what I found at a local town park where  
43 somebody came in and was digging holes and depositing construction  
44 and demolition debris in these holes and then burying it. To what,  
45 you know, a higher up on the end of the spectrum, you know,  
46 18-wheeler's worth of debris coming in, possibly from the city, and  
47 getting dumped in our parks and it's all unacceptable.

48  
49 We even learned -- it all has to be stopped and, you know, I think  
50 that what we're trying to do to determine, you know, we're clearly  
51 scratching the surface. And you're right, whether, you know, on  
52 the spectrum and we just need to kind of determine where we're at  
53 and make sure we can take steps to try to prevent it from happening  
54 as much as we can.

1 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

2 And what we spoke about also is, you know, the possibility of  
3 increasing the fines. Some people it's worth it for them to dump.  
4 It's part of doing business.

5  
6 **LEG. LINDSAY:**

7 If I could just continue my question, though. Have you found it to  
8 be in the same locations over and over again where it's habitual or  
9 it's just random, no pattern whatsoever.

11 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

12 Right now I haven't found any other illegal dumping on County  
13 properties that we're aware of. You know, we have thousands and  
14 thousands of acres of property located throughout the County so we  
15 haven't had the ability to go out there and do a full survey of  
16 every single acre and the hundreds of miles of fence line that  
17 adjoin the properties. It will be a big undertaking to physically  
18 do that.

19  
20 **LEG. LINDSAY:**

21 And I know you've obviously just come on board as Commissioner last  
22 year, but in the past has there been a pattern. I don't know if  
23 they kept records.

24  
25 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

26 No, I haven't seen much of that. I found that there's probably  
27 more illegal dumping on our streets than there is in our parks.

28  
29 **LEG. LINDSAY:**

12:48PM 30

31 Okay. I just -- if there's an opportunity to utilize technology to  
32 do this I think we might be more successful. I would support the  
33 purchasing of -- the technology costs have come down dramatically  
34 and I just think it could be an effective tool if it's happening in  
35 some type of particular pattern.

36 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

37 It would definitely be a deterrent.

38  
39 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

12:48PM 40

41 And Legislator Anker and I have reached out to Commissioner Sini  
42 asking for supportive technology like cameras for our parks, for  
43 everything from dumping to vandalism, graffiti to we have drug  
44 deals that go down in our parklands. So, you know, the camera  
45 facilities that he could share with the Parks Department, you know,  
46 would be very valuable. So we have reached out and we'll be  
47 talking about that later this week. Legislator Stern.

48 **LEG. STERN:**

12:49PM 50

49 So I'm supportive of this effort, but as you mentioned, we have  
50 thousands of acres and we have hundreds of miles of fence line. So  
51 with this important undertaking you had alluded to before, I mean,  
52 there's -- manpower obviously is an issue, and so as I read this  
53 legislation there is a report that needs to be developed and  
54 completed within an amount of time and it needs to be presented for  
55 our consideration and determine what, if anything, to do going  
56 forward.



1 So within this finite period of time, with manpower already being  
2 an issue, who conducts this survey, are you going to be able to get  
3 it done in time, and is it going to be in-depth enough for us to be  
4 able to develop some real conclusions and solutions rather than  
5 have just a, you know, a half-assed effort that's going to end up  
6 on a shelf someplace.

7  
8 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

9 Well, I'll be looking for an extension. No, I did speak with the  
10 Presiding Officer on his first draft of the bill and he did change  
11 it a little bit, broke it down a little bit to more of an isolated  
12 area where the large trucks come in, so I think that's going to  
13 help us out. And it doesn't really address every acre. It's just  
14 going in there and looking at the properties. Like I said, we  
15 can't physically get out there in that timeline and look at every  
16 single acre, it's just physically impossible. But to come in and  
17 survey the areas where a truck could come in to dump, it definitely  
18 narrows down the scope because, you know, obviously you can only go  
19 so far into a park. It's either a parking lot or get into a trail  
20 and that narrows down my search area, so to speak, and makes it --  
21 yes, it makes it doable.

22  
23 **LEG. STERN:**

24 That being the case, I would think that those would be the areas  
25 within our parks that are under the most common surveillance.  
26 Those are the parts that Parks personnel would tend to see more  
27 than the other outlying areas. So my question then would be what  
28 are we going to learn that's any different as a result of  
29 conducting this survey that we don't already know or should know.

30  
31 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

32 Well, I'll tell you this much. What I found was along a trail  
33 that's frequented by walkers every day and you just really had to  
34 be eyes open looking for it. And I think that if the Parks  
35 Department, and again, this isn't my piece of legislation, but I  
36 think that if the Parks Department is directed to survey and be on  
37 the lookout for what could potentially be dumping, when you have an  
38 eye towards that, you see things that you might not have seen  
39 otherwise.

40  
41 So in the case where I found the dumping, you know, a constituent  
42 called and complained about a fence and said some people were  
43 dumping, and I walked in. And if I had walked that trail without  
44 being told to look for dumping, I probably, you know, would have  
45 seen the litter, yes, there was a tire and there was a rowboat and  
46 obviously some cans and bottles and things. But I don't know that  
47 I would have actually, you know, had my eyes out and seen the rest  
48 of it for what it was, which was siding, laminate flooring, two by  
49 fours, roofing shingles, carpeting, sticking out of mounds of  
50 dirt -- protruding from mounds of dirt over and over and over  
51 again. And if you just kind of walk through and you're not  
52 thinking about it you might not see it, especially since leaves  
53 cover it up, you know, only after a few days. So I think that, you  
54 know, directing the survey for this purpose maybe we will find  
55 something that -- just someone driving by on a trail wouldn't have  
56 really been looking for.

1 **CHAIRMAN STERN:**

2 So I appreciate all of that and I suppose that that would be true  
3 of those who utilize our parks and in that capacity as a layperson,  
4 even though you're someone that has a keen eye for that type of  
5 thing, but here we're talking about our Parks personnel. So isn't  
6 that their responsibility on a daily basis anyway. I guess that's  
7 my concern. So here while I'm supportive of the effort and I think  
8 this is important information to have, whether we direct our Parks  
9 personnel to do this specifically or not, it is the kind of thing  
10 that they should be doing on a regular basis as a part of their  
11 responsibilities. I guess I just -- I bring it up because it's my  
12 hope that if we're going to undertake this effort that it be done  
13 in a meaningful way and we can get some real information to work  
14 with, if there is information out there that we need to have going  
15 forward.

17 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

18 Does this require that the Parks Department only -- Parks  
19 Department employees only are the ones who do the surveying or can  
20 they enlist, you know, let's say Eagle Scouts or Life Scouts or  
21 volunteer -- I know the Town of Babylon had a Park -- oh, what was  
22 it called, surrogate. There was a program they established where  
23 they trained --

25 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

26 The Town of Huntington did that.

27  
28 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

29 The Town of Babylon had done this. They did a full training of  
30 residents, this is back in 1989, and the Town of Huntington has a  
31 similar program now.

33 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

34 Park stewardship.

35  
36 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

37 Stewards. That's what it was, right. Does this allow for  
38 volunteer park stewards? Because many of our parks do have friends  
39 groups, etcetera, so does it allow for the surveying to be done by  
40 volunteer groups if we are fortunate enough to have them ready,  
41 willing and able?

43 **MR. NOLAN:**

44 The resolution just directs the department but not the survey, and  
45 how they do it is up to them. It doesn't limit it to County  
46 employees only.

47  
48 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

49 Okay. Legislator McCaffrey.

50  
51 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

52 Thank you. Commissioner, I'm just looking at this as, and talking  
53 about West Hills, which I kind of think that this is sort of a  
54 reaction to West Hills. Would we be better served instead of using  
55 your limited resources to go out and do surveys, which we've had  
56 discussions about your limited resources and your need for -- that

1 they're already spread kind of thin now. I mean, this is a case  
2 where over a series of a period of time that the trucks were coming  
3 back and forth, right, into our park and it was at least of the  
4 knowledge of the person that we were under contract with, I guess,  
5 or who use that facility. They had knowledge of this, seeing these  
6 trucks coming and going. And, you know, to the extent that, you  
7 know, I know the investigation isn't complete, but they clearly had  
8 knowledge that these trucks were coming, whether they directed them  
9 or not. I mean, isn't -- shouldn't we be looking at these things  
10 and just saying, you know, to the people in these parks and say,  
11 *Hey, if you see a truck coming into here you need to let us know,*  
12 instead of directing you with your limited resources to go out and  
13 do a survey, you know, which you've already said that you'd need an  
14 extension to do, and that would take away from something else. I  
15 mean, is there a better way to do this than doing -- having tasking  
16 your already stretched thin workforce to go do a survey, which is  
17 I'm not quite sure what the benefit of that would be, other than  
18 say we found what we found.

20 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

21 I think West Hills is a special circumstance and, you know, since  
22 it still isn't finalized it's kind of hard to talk about it unless  
23 we go into an Executive Session, which I would be happy to do at  
24 any time with anybody.

25  
26 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

27 But, please remember, not unlike Roberto Clemente Park in Islip.  
28 This is not like it's a one-off.

29  
30 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

31 Right, right, but the problems were the people at that park  
32 acknowledged that this was occurring, and that's what I'm saying.  
33 So instead of doing a survey, why don't we just reach out to the  
34 Park managers and the people who are responsible for the parks and  
35 say, *If you see trucks coming and going in here you need to call*  
36 *the police right away or call us right away and ascertain what*  
37 *they're doing there,* instead of doing the survey after the fact  
38 and say, *Well, yeah, there was stuff here.* Why don't we be  
39 proactive and get out in front of this and try and prevent this  
40 from happening instead of going around and saying, *Oh yeah, there's*  
41 *something over here. How did it get there? I have no idea.* So, I  
42 mean.

44 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

45 Well, I think part of Legislator Hahn's bill would address that. I  
46 think that it's the outreach that, you know, goes along with that  
47 bill to neighbors and constituents or park -- people that attend  
48 the parks. But I think, yeah, it could be an effort that we could  
49 definitely undertake and easily with all of our lessees that we  
50 have. Most of them are a less likely place. Like I said, this  
51 West Hills was kind of isolated. And, you know, like I said, I'd  
52 be happy to talk to you offline about it.

54 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

55 I understand, and that's why I didn't go into too much detail.

1 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

2 Right.

3  
4 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

5 We know that there was more than one truck driving down there and  
6 that people saw these trucks going down there. I think we'd get a  
7 -- it's a matter of just educating them to say *If you see*  
8 *something, say something*. And that's it, instead of, you know,  
9 having you use your resources to do a survey, which you going into  
10 the spring and summer season is when you need your people most.

11  
12 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

13 Thank you.

14  
15 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

16 Okay. Mr. Presiding Officer, this is your bill. Would you like to  
17 comment?

18  
19 **P.O. GREGORY:**

12:59PM 20 Sure, thank you. I was in another room and they told me that you  
21 guys were discussing the bill. My intention is, and I certainly  
22 respect the comments of Legislator McCaffrey and his concern and  
23 certainly the Commissioner. The intention here is we've heard of  
24 dumping, some of them were very publicized, but there was an  
25 incident, just to make the point, in Brookhaven. I'm not sure if  
26 it was in Legislator Hahn's district, but she certainly was very  
27 active in reporting it. That had been there for I don't know how  
28 long, it certainly wasn't recent. So my intention was to, you  
29 know, some of our parks are vulnerable to this type of behavior. I  
01:00PM 30 think it would be wise of us to go out and say, *Hey, you know, look*  
31 *at and review* -- and it could be the Park manager to do it. Say,  
32 *Hey, here's an area, we saw something or we didn't see anything,*  
33 but to get a sense of what's out there. Because I believe there  
34 may be a real opportunity that something has been done that we may  
35 not be aware of, and that's really what it was.

36  
37 And to your point, Kevin, Legislator Hahn's bill to work with the  
38 local communities to find stewards, to be the eyes in the community  
39 looking out for those trucks or those nefarious characters that may  
01:00PM 40 want to do these types of things, you know, she's going to be  
41 moving forward with her bill and that would certainly address the  
42 concerns that you have. But my point is stuff may have already  
43 happened that we're not aware of and, you know, it's not a  
44 laborious process, but we should try to find out if there is  
45 something that's already happening and try to address it as quickly  
46 as possible.

47  
48 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

49 My only is like the Commissioner has already said I need an  
01:01PM 50 extension, and we're coming into the season where they're going to  
51 start gearing up for the spring and summer season. I'm just not  
52 quite sure. If there's an outreach, okay, but to put them on a  
53 deadline to report back within a certain amount of days with the  
54 surveys, I would think there's something maybe we could do under  
55 less strenuous, you know, consequences for the Parks Department at  
56 a time when their resources could best be used somewhere else.

1 That's my concern here. I have no problem with the outreach,  
2 nobody wants the dumping in our parks, but I just think that  
3 there's a different way to go about it and I just think 120 days is  
4 a short period of time for them to be able to create that report  
5 that we're looking for. But I agree with the things that you want  
6 to accomplish. I'm just thinking about the timeframe is my biggest  
7 concern.

8  
9 **P.O. GREGORY:**

01:01PM 10 Yeah, no, well, you know, we wanted to get it done before the  
11 season gets underway, when more people potentially will be in the  
12 parks and could be subject to being harmed in some way with the  
13 dumping that may be there, so we were hoping to get it addressed  
14 before the season picks up. That was really the intention.

15  
16 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

17 If I may. And the Presiding Officer was very accommodating when we  
18 first put the bill out. He met with us and we did voice our  
19 concerns about some of the original bill and the hard undertaking  
01:02PM 20 of it, and he did lower the scope, so to speak, of, you know, low  
21 attendance and accessible by a truck. So that part of it could,  
22 you know, could be very doable in the short period of time because  
23 the scope was lowered. At first it was very too broad and it  
24 addressed every park where there really wasn't a possibility of the  
25 illegal dumping. We really -- that's the whole effort behind this  
26 bill we were trying to find. But I really -- I do appreciate that  
27 but we could possibly get this done fairly quick.

28  
29 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

01:03PM 30 Well, that was my concern. I mean, is there a plan, how much  
31 resources would it take, you know, the cost, would it be taken away  
32 from something else that needs to be done at this period of time.  
33 I'm only looking to find the balance and if the scope has been  
34 narrowed, you know, and even then I'm not quite sure -- we'd have  
35 to identify the sites, then we'd have to send out the resources at  
36 a time when I know that your resources are needed as we gear up for  
37 that season.

38  
39 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

01:03PM 40 It's getting to that point, yes.

41  
42 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

43 Yeah. And I'm not quite sure that this is, you know, such a large  
44 scale problem in that it can't be handled without at least on the  
45 preliminary basis before we can do a complete rollout of, you know,  
46 a real more specified plan just to say, *Hey, if you see something,*  
47 *say something.* I think that might have, you know, accomplished  
48 things as well as in the course of their workday or have some sort  
49 of plan that isn't tied to 120 days, which would take away from the  
01:04PM 50 ability of the Parks Department with its limited crew now to be  
51 able to get ready for the spring and summer season. That's my only  
52 concern. I don't want people saying the parks can't open because  
53 we're doing the survey. Thank you.

54  
55 **P.O. GREGORY:**

56 We were hoping maybe we'd get you in some work boots and help out

1 the cause.

2

3 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

4 Ready to go.

5

6 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

7 Okay. Were there any other questions?

8

9 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

01:04PM 10 It won't take long for any of the parks in my district to be  
11 surveyed.

12

13 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

14 All right. We have a motion and a second. All those in favor?  
15 Opposed? Abstentions? 1953 is approved. (*Vote: 6-0-0-0 -*  
16 *Presiding Officer Gregory is included in the vote*)

### 18 Introductory Resolutions

19

20 **1004-17 - Establishing a Parks Watch Program for County Parkland**  
21 **(Hahn).** I'll make a motion to approve. Seconded by Legislator  
22 Stern.

23

24 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

25 On the motion.

26

27 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

28 Legislator McCaffrey.

29

30 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

31 Legislator Hahn, can you just give some details about the -- like  
32 what this is about in terms of County resources used for this?

33

34 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

35 Sure thing. Yeah, so I think I described just a little while ago  
36 what prompted me to put in this bill. You know, I had a complaint  
37 from a resident. I went out with my staff myself and discovered  
38 what clearly was ongoing dumping, in a town park granted, but park  
39 nonetheless. Not just dumping, but purposefully digging and  
01:05PM 40 burying construction and debris materials. Mound after mound,  
41 after mound, after mound, after mound, after mound of materials.  
42 Not a single mound, dozens of mounds of materials. And so, you  
43 know, it was pretty clear to me that this had been going on -- some  
44 of the two by fours that were protruding from the mounds were  
45 clearly pretty old. But then again, you know, weathering might not  
46 take too long. I'm not a scientist so I'm not sure how long it  
47 would take a two by four to weather like what I saw, but some of it  
48 just appeared older. There was some covering and brush that had  
49 grown in over some of the mounds.

50

51 This had been going on for a very long time. The fencing had been  
52 pulled back to allow access by either a small truck or maybe  
53 wheelbarrows. I'm not quite sure how the materials were brought in  
54 that were buried. And it just kind of occurred to me that it would  
55 be very useful if we had an established group of residents who  
56 lived, you know, adjacent to our parks to be kind of on the

1 lookout, like a neighborhood watch, like a community watch,  
2 creating a parks watch.

3  
4 So that really the intention of this is to have our Parks  
5 Department reach out to the adjacent neighbors of our parks and ask  
6 them to be on the lookout for dumping, for vandalism, so that when  
7 they do see tractor trailers, if they were to see tractor trailers  
8 driving into a park and there weren't major renovations going on,  
9 anything suspicious, wheelbarrows being rolled in with two by fours  
01:08PM 10 and vinyl siding and roofing shingles, wheelbarrows being brought  
11 in with concrete and bricks and glass that, you know, maybe they  
12 report it.

13  
14 So that's kind of the purpose here, is that we reach out to our  
15 neighbors and we ask them to be our eyes and our ears. If you see  
16 something say something kind of thing, and that it's -- because we  
17 cannot have a parks ranger in every acre of our park. We cannot  
18 even have a full-time parks ranger in every park. So, you know, we  
19 really do need, and our neighbors of our parks are the ones who  
01:08PM 20 love our parks. I know Legislator Kennedy knows this. She has  
21 some really fantastic community groups that, you know, already are  
22 established that watch the park. But if every adjacent neighbor  
23 kind of was reached out to, informed also that they can't dump  
24 their yard waste.

25  
26 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

27 I understand the issue and I think it's good, but my concern is it  
28 says the department will conduct outreach to neighbors of County  
29 parkland. What does that mean? Are we going to do mailings? Are  
01:09PM 30 we going to call them? Are we going to knock on doors?

31  
32 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

33 So I think you'll appreciate the fact that I did not micromanage  
34 exactly how that will work. I certainly could have put in several  
35 more whereas clauses and if I, you know, need to, if you guys want  
36 me to I can do that but, you know, I left that up to the Parks  
37 Department. I would imagine at minimum I would hope that we did  
38 actually mail but, you know, they have to work with GIS and work to  
39 determine, you know, how many residences and/or businesses we are  
01:09PM 40 talking about that line our parks and have, you know, maybe a  
41 priority listing of who they can get to and how, the most efficient  
42 way to reach these neighbors. You know, I don't even know -- we  
43 are talking 46,000, 47,000 acres of parkland.

44  
45 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

46 I think that we're up to close to 70 with all the other things that  
47 we've purchased that are water quality, open space. You know,  
48 there are parcels -- half acre.

49  
50 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

51 Right. And so it is, you know, it is up to GIS to determine how  
52 many we're talking about and, you know, they can decide how best to  
53 reach out to these folks.

54  
55 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

56 I would support, you know, putting something on our web page, like

1 even in the front just saying, you know, dumping in our parks is a  
2 big program, do you see this contact here. But if we're going to  
3 do a mailing to every house and we have to identify them and then  
4 mail to them to say, *Hey, you know, this is a problem. If you see*  
5 *anything reach out to us.* I just don't want to say that there's a  
6 mandate for the Parks to do that. I mean, if we want to -- you  
7 know, social medial, e-mails and that kind of thing, I think it's a  
8 good idea but I don't know the extent to which we're committing to  
9 here.

01:11PM 10

11 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

12 Well, again, I think that, you know, our parkland is precious. It  
13 is the people's property. Our parks are our people's property, and  
14 we certainly have the responsibility of protecting it. And, you  
15 know, this is part of that, reaching out. Even if it is a mailing  
16 we clearly are going to go over the 250 limit and will have the  
17 opportunity to have bulk mail. It is very easy for GIS to  
18 establish addresses. That will not be hard to do. It's done all  
19 the time. And I don't see mailing to these houses being a  
20 tremendous burden. You know, there's no question in my mind this  
21 can be done rather easily. Now, I know Leslie Kennedy is going to  
22 complain about the cost of a stamp, but once again we do have bulk  
23 mailing.

01:11PM 20

24  
25 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

26 But we don't know what the cost is. I know you had concerns in  
27 other previous meetings about agreeing to something we don't know  
28 what the cost is. I would kind of like to get that narrowed down.

29  
30 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

31 And I did ask for that, to know the number of households and you  
32 had said you were going to try to look into that. So I know the  
33 Planning Department can do that.

34  
35 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

36 Can we table this until we find out what the cost of this is?

37  
38 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

39 I don't think we need to. We have a Fiscal Impact Statement, don't  
40 we?

01:12PM 40

41  
42 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

43 Does the Fiscal Impact Statement -- if we're not sure how many  
44 houses there are for mailing is the Fiscal Impact --

45  
46 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

47 It does not require a mailing. The bill does not require a  
48 mailing.

49  
50 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

51 But if it allows for a mailing, which is being discussed here and  
52 sounds like it's something that is going to be encouraged to do,  
53 why would it not be included in the Fiscal Impact Statement?

54  
55 **MS. HALLORAN:**

56 I can revisit that but right now I believe it doesn't specifically



1 -- to reach out to neighbors could include putting a sign up at the  
2 park saying -- you know, it doesn't necessary have to be a mailing  
3 to neighbors. So depending on how it's approached and what the  
4 plan is it would -- it would be reflected differently in the impact  
5 obviously.

6  
7 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

8 Sure. Is the discretion going to be to the Commissioner?  
9 Commissioner, do you plan on doing any mailings?

11 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

12 Not in that short period of time that's allocated.

13  
14 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

15 Legislator Kennedy.

16  
17 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

18 Two questions. George, if Parks decides to put up signs or to do a  
19 mailing, do we have to vote on those?

01:14PM

20  
21 **MR. NOLAN:**

22 No. No, we do not.

23  
24 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

25 Okay. I don't have a problem with this bill. As humorous as it  
26 sounds, there are a lot of neighbors around all these parks and  
27 that's a lot of funding, even if it is bulk mail. So I would not  
28 be for mailings. I will be the one to suggest again make up some  
29 fliers and when I walk my districts I will hand them out to  
30 everyone around the park, and I think our Legislators and our  
31 Legislative staff can do that and so can some Park staff if they  
32 happen to live near it. We can make this cost effective. I think  
33 you folks can assess.

34  
35 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

36 Immediately, I mean, the website, Facebook page that we have, get  
37 the word out, absolutely.

38  
39 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

40 Yeah, and I think that each Legislative office, I'm actually about  
41 to launch the Parks Passport, you know, a pilot in my district, and  
42 I think that each Legislator can work this program, as Legislator  
43 Kennedy said. You know, we should probably have a Facebook page  
44 for each park and work to get our neighbors -- you know, work to  
45 get the neighbors involved in that and posting and alerting via  
46 e-mail, via the website, alerting our Parks Department of issues  
47 and then knowing when to call 911 if they see some kind of dumping  
48 or vandalism or illegal activity in progress. And so, you know, I  
49 think it's important that folks feel empowered and feel somewhat  
50 responsible as our neighbors, you know, to have an eye and ear on  
51 our parks.

52  
53 **LEG. MCCAFFREY:**

54 I don't disagree. As you see, my concern is if we have a mailing,  
55 and it has not been determined if we're going to do and what the  
56 cost of that mailing would be etcetera, and that's my concern. If

1 we're going to do fliers and we're going to take care of it in each  
2 legislative district it wouldn't take me long to notify all the  
3 residents of any in my district, because I don't have any parks in  
4 my district. I have one, but the Town of Babylon is responsible  
5 for it.

6  
7 But anyway, I'm just concerned about the open-ended cost to this.  
8 If it excluded mailings -- or if we said we're going to try this  
9 other stuff first, if that's the commitment I hear from the  
01:16PM 10 Commissioner or the urging that he's going to get is that we're  
11 going to do social media, signs, whatever, and then possibly come  
12 back to the Legislature if we decide to do mailings, I'm okay. If  
13 not, I'd really like to, you know, and as you said, if mailings are  
14 included then the Fiscal Impact Statement that's included in this  
15 legislation is not complete.

16  
17 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

18 And also if the Parks Department decide they want to use, if it's  
19 small cost, if they want to use what's in their budget to do it,  
01:17PM 20 they certainly could. Anyone else have any comments? Legislator  
21 Kennedy.

22  
23 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

24 I understand what you're saying. I do feel that our Parks  
25 Department uses reasonable judgment and that they will make a fine  
26 decision as to not wasting money. Thanks.

27  
28 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

29 Okay. So we have a motion and a second. All those in favor?  
30 Opposed? Abstentions? Thank you. It is approved. **(Vote:**  
31 **5-0-0-0)**. Do you have anything else for us, Commissioner?

32  
33 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

34 No. I'm fine, thank you.

35  
36 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

37 Thank you. Okay, with that being said, I also as the new Chair of  
38 the Parks Committee, I am looking to tour County parks that I have  
39 not yet been to and have not yet done so, so if anyone would like  
01:18PM 40 for me to walk with them some of the parks in their district --  
41 yeah, I guess I don't have to go out -- that's good, Babylon is  
42 far. You know, I am looking to do that. I've done in my district  
43 with the Commissioner rather early on and hopefully everyone is  
44 doing the same, bringing him, as our fairly relatively new  
45 Commissioner, out to see every one of our parks and explain issues  
46 that our constituents have and bring him up-to-date. So I am also  
47 as Chair I'm looking to do that and would welcome an invitation  
48 from any of my colleagues. So with that, we are adjourned. Thank  
49 you.
