3 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

4 We're going to get started. Welcome, everyone, to the
5 Legislature's Parks and Recreation Committee. We're going to ask
6 that all rise for the Pledge led by Legislator Kennedy.

7
8 **Salutation**

9
10 12:35PM Have a seat. Okay. I'm going to request the committee's
11 indulgence that we take an appointment out of order just very
12 quickly. We have an appointment to the Suffolk County Vanderbilt
13 Museum Commission, so I'm going make a motion to take 1038 of 2017
14 out of order, Appointing Clara Macri as a member of the Suffolk
15 County Vanderbilt Museum Commission. May I have a second?

16
17 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

18 I'll second.

19
20 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

21 Second to take it out of order by Legislator Kennedy. All those in
22 favor? Opposed? Abstentions? It is before us. So we have **IR**
23 **1038 - Appointing Clara Macri as a member of the Suffolk County**
24 **Vanderbilt Museum Commission (Trustee No. 3) (Anker)**. And if Miss
25 Macri can come forward. You can have a seat here at the table.
26 The Clerk will just let you -- and then we'll handle the Public
27 Portion as soon as we're done with this.

28
29 **MS. MACRI:**

30 Thank you very much.

31
32 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

33 We really appreciate your willingness to serve on the Vanderbilt
34 Commission. So if you won't mind just giving a brief -- tell us a
35 little bit about yourself.

36
37 **MS. MACRI:**

38 Thank you. Thank you for the opportunity. My name is Clara Macri.
39 I live in Mt. Sinai, but I am a lover of architecture and history.
40 12:37PM I think the Vanderbilt Museum is extraordinary and I think we are
41 very fortunate that it is in our community. And I'm also an avid
42 fundraiser for a variety of fabulous causes, from hospitals to
43 other communities. And the point of interest is I also went to
44 school in Salve Regina University in Newport, Rhode Island, where I
45 was surrounded by beautiful mansions of the Vanderbilts, and so I
46 understand the history. I love the history, and I think the past
47 needs to be preserved to teach the young people. And Mr. William
48 K. Vanderbilt left us all quite a treasure. I would be very
49 honored to participate and raise as much money as possible.

50
51 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

52 Excellent. Thank you. Are there any questions from the committee?
53 Okay. With that, I'll make a motion.

54
55 **LEG. STERN:**

56 Second.

1 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

2 Seconded by Legislator Stern. All those in favor? Opposed?
3 Abstentions? It is approved. **(VOTE: 4-0-0-1 Not Present:**
4 **Legislator Lindsay)**. This will now go before the full Legislature,
5 and you do not need to attend that meeting on Tuesday. So thank
6 you very much for your willingness to serve in this capacity. I
7 look forward to working with you.

8
9 **MS. MACRI:**

10 Thank you, Ms. Hahn. Thank you, everyone.

11
12 **Public Portion**

13
14 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

15 Now to the Public Portion. Welcome, everyone. We have -- I have
16 six cards. If there is anyone who would like to speak but did not
17 fill out a card, you can do that now.

18
19 *(Legislator Lindsay entered the meeting)*

20
21 The first speaker we have is Joseph Gittleman. You can come up to
22 the podium and you will have three minutes.

23
24 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**

25 Thank you very much. I want to thank the committee for the
26 opportunity to speak here. My name is Joseph Gittleman. I have
27 been a resident of Suffolk County since 1975. I now reside in
28 Center Moriches. I'd like to read the following into the record on
29 behalf of the 1600 member families of the Long Island Beach Buggy
30 Association. And if time permits following the statement I would
31 appreciate the opportunity to make some comments and observations.

32
33 "The members of the Long Island Beach Buggy Association, LIBBA, are
34 disappointed in the 2017 Suffolk County Park System fee structure
35 as it relates to camping at our ocean beaches. The Long Island
36 Beach Buggy Association is disheartened that there was no
37 advertised comment period for the changes now being instituted. As
38 a result, the opportunity to present the views and input of the
39 LIBBA membership in determining a reasonable fee structure was
40 disregarded. It is very disturbing that the substantial fee
41 increases were apparently arrived at behind closed doors with
42 little, if any, transparency.

43
44 The Long Island Beach Buggy Association represents 1600 families on
45 Long Island. LIBBA members can no longer stand by and watch our
46 fees increase by as much as 77%. Let us consider a typical Long
47 Island Beach Buggy Association member as an example. If one of our
48 Suffolk County resident members wants to go to the outer beach for
49 the weekend, it would cost the usual fees of \$30 for a green key
50 and \$100 for the outer beach pass for the year. Now we'll be
51 expected to also pay \$14 a night for camping, plus \$3 for flagship
52 park fee and \$9 for the amenity fee plus a \$10 reservation fee.
53 And also the County will start to charge \$12 to disabled veterans.
54 LIBBA members who are not Suffolk residents will be paying
55 substantially more as non-resident fees skyrocketed as well.

1 What criteria was used to designate a Suffolk County park a
2 flagship park? Is it the mere presence of the Atlantic Ocean? The
3 amenity fee for outer beaches raises the obvious question; what
4 amenities? The outer beach camping is best described as
5 boondocking or primitive camping as there are no amenities on the
6 outer beaches. Truck, RV and trailer campers must be
7 self-contained to provide power, a toilet with self-contained
8 permanently built-in sewage holding tank and potable water. So
9 what amenities are we missing? Does Suffolk County consider a
10 numbered stake in a roped off outer beach camping area as an
11 amenity? At outer beach camping locations there are no lifeguards,
12 no shower facilities, no picnic tables or cooking areas, no leveled
13 hard parking paths, no lights and no garbage receptacles as this is
14 a carry in/carry out area.

16 And getting to the outer beach camping area entails four-wheel
17 driving over primitive, narrow, unmaintained sand roads and open
18 beach. To add insult to that, after paying a non-refundable fee
19 for the yearly outer beach permit, there is no expectation that the
20 beach will actually be open due to storm erosion or endangered bird
21 nesting.

23 Long Island Beach Buggy Association members are rightfully
24 concerned that Suffolk County appears to be using the park system
25 as a cash cow to raise revenue for the collective Suffolk operating
26 budget. We have seen little return directly to the maintenance of
27 the beaches and camping areas commensurate with the revenues
28 historically generated at these locations. For comparison
29 purposes, as Suffolk is claiming the new fees bring the County in
30 line with State beaches, the yearly fee for New York State outer
31 beach permit, including primitive camping within Suffolk County on
32 State Park beach areas, is a mere \$65, no additional fees.

34 The Long Island Beach Buggy Association is and has been in
35 existence for nearly 60 years, dedicated to improving access and
36 protecting the public resource that the seashore provides. We have
37 been and continue to be stewards of this changing and fragile
38 environment by organizing and conducting beach clean ups, dune
39 restoration and securing areas" --

41 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

42 Hoping you're wrapping up. I keep thinking you're about to finish,
43 because that was your time, when you heard that ding.

44
45 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**

46 I've got one short paragraph.

47
48 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

49 Okay. So will you be submitting that for the record?

50
51 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**

52 Yes, I am.

53
54 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

55 Because we will circulate it to all the members here so that they
56 can --

1 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**

2 It's already been submitted.

3
4 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

5 Excellent. Does anybody have any questions? Legislator McCaffrey.

6
7 **LEG. McCAFFREY:**

8 Thank you. You know, we did have hearings over these increases.
9 It was at the Parks in December of last year when we talked about
10 these increases before they were voted on. And one of the things I
11 was concerned about was the comparisons to what other
12 municipalities -- and I was just reviewing the record about what we
13 had spoken about. And it was my understanding that these fees that
14 we were charging were now going to bring us in line with say State
15 or towns, and I specifically asked that.

16
17 You brought up the point that for the camping that you're speaking
18 about on the outer beach, where there doesn't seem to be too many
19 amenities from what you described to me other than the ocean view,
20 that the impression I got speaking to the Commissioner was that the
21 fees would be in line with the State. Can you explain to me how
22 there's a difference in those fees? From what you're telling me
23 the outer beach on the -- for the State beaches where there are no
24 amenities, similar to ours, it's a \$65 annual fee and that's it?

25
26 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**

27 That is it. I get my fee -- I get my outer beach permit, four by
28 four permit, from New York State every year over at Babylon State
29 Park Headquarters. That entitles me to use Robert Moses -- not
30 Robert Moses, Democrat Point, which is part of Robert Moses,
31 Napeague State Park, Hither Hills State Park, I'm probably missing
32 one here or there, for nighttime fishing or daytime access to these
33 beaches. If I want to camp on those beaches overnight or stay
34 overnight in my RV or truck camper, there are no trailers permitted
35 out there, I am entitled to do that. There are no additional fees,
36 no additional charges. There are sure no amenities other than the
37 ones I carry with me and, you know, there's nothing other expected.

38
39 **LEG. McCAFFREY:**

40 Could you explain to me how it's different now under the new, if
41 you would do that, same thing, same type of camping on the outer
42 beach in the County parks now. What would you have to pay?

43
44 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**

45 Well, the way I worked it out here I would be paying \$30 for my
46 green key for three years, fine. I'm not arguing with that. A
47 \$100 outer beach permit, we're not arguing with that. But in
48 addition to that, and we're already paying for the outer beach
49 permit where there are no amenities, there are no showers, there
50 are no flush toilets, there is very little law enforcement, quite
51 frankly, I'm going to pay a nightly fee of I think it was 12 or
52 \$14, a flagship fee. I don't know what a flagship park is, and I
53 don't understand how a flagship park such as Montauk, Teddy
54 Roosevelt on the outer beach, Cupsogue on the outer beach,
55 Shinnecock East on the outer beach, their toilet facilities consist
56 of two or three porta potties remote from the beach. There are no

1 flush toilets, there is no running water on the beach. There are
2 no cooking sites. You've got a camping area on the sand. That's
3 all you're getting.

4
5 **LEG. McCAFFREY:**

6 So how much does this add up to? You said 12 to 14 for the
7 overnight.

8
9 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**

10 You're talking --

11
12 **LEG. McCAFFREY:**

13 Flagship fee is -- do you know?

14
15 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**

16 I have it worked out here. It was about 20 -- I think just the
17 nightly fees come to about \$27 I believe for a non-resident.

18
19 **LEG. McCAFFREY:**

20 Okay. And so previous to this all you paid was the green key for
21 three years and the \$100 outer beach permit?

22
23 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**

24 There were individual reservation fees, I understand, on the outer
25 beaches, but this is increased now. In addition to the reservation
26 fee and the nightly fee there is now a flagship fee and an amenity
27 fee.

28
29 **LEG. McCAFFREY:**

30 I'm just trying to get a handle on what went up for this. So it's
31 about \$27 a night is what it went up for you?

32
33 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**

34 I believe it is, yes.

35
36 **LEG. McCAFFREY:**

37 So that didn't exist before and now it does.

38
39 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**

40 Pretty much, yeah. We're not unsympathetic to the plight of the
41 Suffolk County, you know, budget and the need for funding. We
42 would just like to see what is returned to the beaches commensurate
43 with the amount of money that is collected on a yearly basis.
44 We're not seeing it. We're not seeing where the amenities are.
45 Where are the amenities? I have to drag them with me.

46
47 **LEG. McCAFFREY:**

48 Okay. And the same -- one of the -- the last question I have is,
49 just to reiterate, the same camping facilities that you get from
50 New York State doesn't cost you anything other than the \$65 New
51 York State fee; correct?

52
53 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**

54 That is true if you are camping on what is the outer --

1 **LEG. McCAFFREY:**
2 Which you are doing when you come to our outer beaches as well.

3
4 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**
5 Exactly. We're not talking about the organized campground of
6 Hither Hills.

7
8 **LEG. McCAFFREY:**
9 Correct.

10
11 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**
12 They have an outer beach area where we camp as well.

13
14 **LEG. McCAFFREY:**
15 I'm just trying to compare apples to apples, which I was doing when
16 I had asked the questions about -- originally when I was looking at
17 why I should or should not vote for this. Okay. Thank you very
18 much.

19
20 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
21 Any other questions? Thank you. And you submitted -- you already
22 submitted your written comments.

23
24 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**
25 Yes, I have. And I would like to thank the committee for the
26 opportunity to speak here. I just wish I was thanking you as well
27 for the opportunity to be actively participating in drawing up the
28 fee structures and being able to discuss them. Because, frankly,
29 at this point it appears to many of our members that some of the
12:48PM 30 people on this committee have never been down to the outer beaches
31 and have no idea what you're talking about. I may be wrong, but
32 that's the impression, and in life impressions are what become
33 fact.

34
35 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
36 Sure. So I have been down there. I have not camped there. That's
37 not something that I do. But we certainly are listening, and you
38 should all know that the Presiding Officer and myself, I'm Kara
39 Hahn, the Chair, new Chair, to this committee, are planning to put
12:49PM 40 together a working group to discuss these changes. They're clearly
41 a little bit more complicated than we thought and there are some
42 clear things that I don't think were intended to happen that need
43 to be corrected.

44
45 That being said, we do not bring in enough money to maintain all
46 the lands that we have. And we will welcome discussions with you
47 on how, you know, how we can have a revenue that properly maintains
48 and elevates our parks to the level they should be. Whether, you
49 know, whether it's the outer beach that we're discussing, whether
12:50PM 50 it's Cupsogue, you know, we have just gems of parks that need to be
51 protected and that need to be maintained. And we have over 46,000
52 acres of official parkland and it could go as high as 70,000 the
53 Parks Commissioner tells me when we consider other lands that are
54 within our holdings. So, you know, we're working on this and it's
55 a work in progress.

1 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**

2 Thank you very much and if any of the members ever needs to get
3 down to the beach, if there isn't enough money in the budget for
4 gas for your vehicles, we'll drive you out there.

5
6 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

7 I would welcome that. I, as Chair of the Parks Committee, you
8 know, new Chair, I have committed to visit all the County parks and
9 are making appointments to go around to see them all. I have been
10 to a number already that you've discussed, but I would go back with
11 you, no question, especially in a buggy.

12
13 **MR. GITTLEMAN:**

14 Thank you very much.

15
16 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

17 Thank you. So the next speaker, Harold Kench, followed by Art
18 Boyd.

19
20 **MR. KENCH:**

21 Thank you very much. Greetings. Thanks for the opportunity to
22 speak. I have a copy of a petition against the new fee structure.
23 It's got over a thousand signatures of people who support the
24 statement I'm about to make. I gave that to the Clerk earlier so
25 everybody should have a copy of the petition and the signatures.

26
27 We pay some of the highest taxes in the County, taxes that go in
28 part to the park system. I know you hear that all the time, but
29 let me back up that statement with some facts. The money is going
30 into a General Fund. It's not earmarked for the parks. I can't
31 name any improvements that I've seen. We've got the same leaky
32 faucets, the same garbage strewn campsites that the patron is left
33 to clean up before setting up camp. The fees are to make more
34 money, not improve the parks.

35
36 If we go off-Island for the same prices these new flagship parks,
37 you get entertainment, you get a swimming pool, lifeguard, cable
38 TV, clubhouse, laundry. We don't get any of that in our County
39 parks and we don't want it. We don't want the prices to go up to
40 pay for these silly amenities.

41
42 The flagship buzzword. That's a flashy title to justify higher
43 prices. Our outer beaches have zero amenities. We bring our own
44 water and electricity, we haul our own sewage and we purchase an
45 additional \$100 pass to drive on that beach so we can tow our
46 campers out to a spot that we've already paid for. The Parks
47 Commissioner says the flagships have more staff and maintenance,
48 thus justifying the price hike. That's in the letter he sent to
49 LIBBA. Montauk is a staff of one most of the time, sometimes two.
50 One time I saw three people out there. Cupsogue and Shinnecock are
51 the same. You're just getting a post in the ground with a number
52 on it and a 50 by 25 foot of sand -- patch of sand, no amenities.
53 We bring them.

54
55 Smith Point prices have gone up because it's now a flagship park on
56 the water. However, an ocean view tier one site will cost you more

1 in addition to being in a flagship park. Aren't we already paying
2 for the flagship status because it's on the water? We're being
3 charged twice for the same amenity.

4
5 You're charging our disabled vets and our active military. As a
6 vet it's disheartening to see how quickly politicians will throw an
7 arm around a veteran during election season for a photo op, and
8 then pass this backdoor tax that will be shouldered by these same
9 vets. A seven day stay at Smith Point flagship tier one spot has
10 increased 1130%. That's not a typo. That same reservation has
11 gone from \$13 last year to \$168 this season. Most disabled
12 veterans living on a fixed VA pension can't afford to camp anymore.
13 Some of these disabled vets are lacking mobility. They can't just
14 jump on a plane and go on vacation. They need to stay close to the
15 VA doctors and their services.

16
17 The Parks Commissioner letter says that vets camp at a discounted
18 rate, but it's only the cheap sites and guess what, those are the
19 first ones that are going to fill up. So now those same vets are
20 left paying for one of these tier one spots. I know of many
21 disabled vets whose preferred form of therapy is getting away from
22 the grind of everyday life and going camping. These men and women
23 wrote a blank check to our country, and now this County here is
24 pricing them out of that one thing that they could do for very
25 little money to help them maintain some semblance of quality of
26 life.

27
28 Now let's talk a little bit about our public lands. Teddy
29 Roosevelt put aside parklands for two reasons, conservation and
30 green space for all to enjoy, not just those who could afford it.
31 We're already paying for these campgrounds and beaches with our
32 taxes. I'm wrapping it up. At what point do these fees become
33 exclusionary? I think they're exclusionary already for some
34 disabled vets, seniors and residents living on an already tight
35 budget.

36
37 These new fees are being pushed on a segment of the electorate that
38 is perceived as being either not having a voice or not regularly
39 exercising their voice; us, the average Joe's and Jane's that had
40 to take a day off of work to be here and to voice our discontent.
41 Please rescind these new fees and in the future have an open forum
42 with the groups who know the parks and beaches before making
43 decisions that affect the parks and beaches. Thank you.

44
45 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

46 Thank you very much. We all received that petition. We very
47 appreciate your input on this. Are there any questions? Thank
48 you.

49
50 **MR. KENCH:**

51 You got it.

52
53 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

54 Art Boyd followed by Lance Reinheimer.

1 **MR. BOYD:**

2 Thank you, everybody. My name is Art Boyd. I represent the
3 Montauk Surfcasters Association. We have 800 members. I know this
4 legislation has already been approved, but I do protest the lack of
5 public notice. These amenity fees are wrong, especially for the
6 activity duty and disabled veterans.

7
8 As for amenities, like everybody said, there are none on the outer
9 beach. There aren't any trash cans, toilets, pump out stations,
10 tables, electric. The only extras that are there are the air
11 compressors and washdown stations which are provided by LIBBA.

12
13 The committee reports that it wants to be in line with the State
14 beaches. As you know, the State charges \$65 for the year and
15 that's it. They do not charge extra to look at the water. Some
16 years ago there was a Suffolk County Fishing Advisory Board who
17 represented some various groups and met monthly to discuss ongoing
18 issues. I urge this committee to reinstate that board in order to
19 keep the lines of communications open and please reconsider these
20 increases.

21
22 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

23 Thank you very much. Are there any questions by the committee?

24
25 **MR. BOYD:**

26 Thank you.

27
28 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

29 Thank you. Lance Reinheimer followed by Joe Kukral.

30
31 **MR. REINHEIMER:**

32 Thank you very much. Lance Reinheimer, Executive Director of the
33 Vanderbilt Museum. I'm here to speak in favor of IR 1054, which is
34 a capital appropriating resolution appropriating \$60,000 in the
35 Capital Program for the replacement of our dump truck, four-wheel
36 drive dump truck that we use for really running the whole museum.
37 This truck is essential for plowing and keeping the property open
38 during the winter and making it safe for our visitors and our
39 staff. But in addition to that, this truck is used year-round for
40 transporting equipment, picking up mulch for our gardens, moving
41 equipment within the property. I included a little folder with
42 some pictures. The next best thing would have been to drive the
43 truck out here but I wanted to make sure I got out here in time for
44 the meeting, so I thought pictures were the next best thing.

45
46 This truck only has 49,000 miles on it, but that 49,000 of hard
47 quarter mile start/stop driving around the property. The truck is
48 essential to the operations of the museum and I hope that you'll
49 see that it's worthy of replacement after 20 years. It has
50 structural problems with the rust and you can see that, through the
51 pictures, this truck really is -- it's just being held together by
52 patching and welding and just keeping it together with Band-Aids.

53
54 And then I also enclosed our most recent brochure that we did an
55 update on. I just received this this week, and if anybody wants
56 any of these brochures for their district offices I brought a

1 supply out here. Any questions -- I'll certainly be happy to
2 answer any questions that you have.

3
4 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

5 Any questions from the committee? Legislator Kennedy.

6
7 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

8 Hi, Lance. I know we just discussed this, but now re-reading it,
9 \$60,000 is the total cost of the new vehicle?

11 **MR. REINHEIMER:**

12 That's a cost I got from DPW vehicles. That includes plow. It's a
13 four-wheel drive vehicle, standard shift.

14
15 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

16 It's not a dump truck.

17
18 **MR. REINHEIMER:**

19 It's a dump truck. This is a dump truck.

21 **LEG. KENNEDY:**

22 Wow. We get a good deal.

23
24 **MR. REINHEIMER:**

25 Well, the trucks that we use for the museum are a lot smaller than
26 the trucks we would use for DPW highways. As you can see from this
27 picture, this is an F350. Possibly we would need something a
28 little bigger than that, maybe an F550, but it's not a full-blown
29 diesel dump truck. This would be gasoline. We have no diesel on
30 the property. We do have a gas tank, and diesel has issues if
31 you're using them for stopping and starting. Diesels are made for
32 the long haul, continuous running. Diesel is not really
33 appropriate for us. So this is a simple gas vehicle dump truck.

2 Good afternoon. My name is Joe Kukral. I'm a co-founder and
3 coordinator of a family camping group formed in 2005. I'm also a
4 member of the Suffolk Committee For Camping and a past board
5 member.

6
7 Suffolk Committee For Camping is a non-profit organization
8 developed to educate and inform the camping community of Suffolk
9 County. Last month I attended this meeting in Hauppauge, and a
01:00PM 10 gentleman got up and spoke and asked if a public meeting had ever
11 been had prior to the price increase. I believe he was told or his
12 response to him was yes it had. I have to say, I have read over
13 the online minutes from this committee meeting and the other Parks
14 meeting and I could find nowhere in any of the online minutes that
15 a public forum or public meeting was ever asked for, ever given.
16 From conversations with the President, Dave Lipman, of the Suffolk
17 Committee For Camping organization, I can honestly say that there
18 was never any input asked from that organization concerning the
19 fees or any of our camping groups within Suffolk County.

20
21 At the February meeting of the Suffolk Committee For Camping
22 several clubs stated outright that they pulled their group camping
23 request for 2017 because they couldn't afford to give up the
24 non-refundable fees. As the gentleman stated last month, he is
25 retired and on a fixed income. Myself dealing with a back injury
26 as a volunteer EMT and for the last two years dealing with cancer,
27 I am too on a fixed income. I'm on disability. In January I was
28 told that I am in complete remission. My wife and I instantly
29 started talking about our camping plans for this year. Then the
01:02PM 30 fees came out. Now, being on a fixed income, as the other
31 gentleman said, do we make reservations within the Suffolk County
32 camping community or do we save our money for that one off-Island
33 excursion that we usually try to do once a year, which we have not
34 done in two years because I have been doing cancer treatments. So
35 now we have to decide do we camp within Suffolk County? Do we save
36 our money and do the one off-Island excursion that usually lasts a
37 week or so? We're still up in the air.

38
39 I offer my services to Legislator Hahn and this committee to set up
01:03PM 40 an evening where this committee can meet with the community to hear
41 public comment. I'd also like -- I don't know if the Commissioner
42 is here, I didn't see him. I'd also like to thank the
43 Commissioner. Recently I had to call over to the County Parks
44 Office to correct a date mistake on one of our group outings. The
45 ladies there are phenomenal. Within a day it was all corrected.
46 She even got into a conversation with me on some of these fees.
47 She not only shed light as to what some of them were for, but how
48 they came about, the \$3 markup fee. I understand that. Don't
49 agree with it, but I understand why that was put into place.
01:03PM 50 Again, I offer my services to set up an evening meeting that a
51 community public address could be done with either Legislator Hahn

32 positions that have been taken regarding the newly implemented fees
33 that haven't existed before. Please reconsider the position that
34 you have taken on these issues. Thank you.

9 Absolutely.

17 feel for them. Nobody likes a fee increase and, you know, it's not
18 an easy decision that we came upon to increase our fees. And as I
19 did state before that we are in line with all of the other
20 municipalities, with Nassau County, if not we're cheaper. Same
21 thing with New York State fees.
