5 All Legislators to the horseshoe, please.

7 Okay, okay, if we could all rise for the Pledge of Allegiance led
8 by Legislator Lindsay.

15 Okay. I know a bunch of us have a commitment. So, we have one
16 card. Joe - I always get it wrong - Kukral?

19 Very good.

22 Sorry about that. I didn't want to butcher it without warning you
23 ahead of time.

29 **MR. KUKRAL:**

30 Very good, thank you. Good afternoon, my name is Joe Kukral from
31 Suffolk Committee for Camping. I would just like to publicly
32 acknowledge two weeks ago we had our 25th annual kickoff at
33 Cathedral Pines in Yaphank. We had over 300 families in
34 attendance. We had a guest appearance by the Parks Commissioner,
35 and there may be some incriminating or -- photos on our website
36 that he may not want us to put there, but we did anyway. And I'd
37 also like to thank the Parks personnel for that weekend. They were
38 a significant help with that many of camping units, people, the
39 meals that we served and everything. The weekend went off without
40 a hitch. We had a presence of the Park Rangers, Suffolk County

42 So, everything went off without a hitch. Lastly, I'd like to
43 congratulate the Commissioner on -- I see he got his shuttle bus

45 well with the campers that we know that will camp at Smith's Point

47 the restaurant area up there from the campground and not have to
48 worry about walking, lugging things or driving, stuff like that,

2 There's always next year.

5 Yes, yes. We have no other cards. Is there anyone else in the
6 audience who would like to speak? Okay, seeing none, we're going
7 to move on. There are a number of Committee members who have
8 something to get to. So, we're going to go quickly through the

24 Motion.

26 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

27 Motion by Legislator Lindsay. Seconded by Legislator Anker. All
28 those in favor? Opposed? Abstentions? It is approved.
29 Introductory resolution -- whoops. Oh, I'm sorry, thank you.
30 We'll get a different second.

31
32 **LEGISLATOR McCAFFREY:**

33 I'll second that.

34
35 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

36 Seconded by Legislator McCaffrey. Thank you very much, Sarah. So,
37 we have a motion by Legislator Lindsay, we have a second -- this is
38 for 1391. We have a second by Legislator McCaffrey. All those in
39 favor? Opposed? Abstentions? **1391 is approved. (Vote:**
40 **5-0-0-0.)**

51 Second by Legislator McCaffrey. All those in favor? Opposed?
52 Abstentions? **1393 is approved. (Vote: 5-0-0-0.)**

11 On the motion real quick.

12
13 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

14 On the motion, Legislator Stern.

15
16 **LEGISLATOR STERN:**

17 Yeah, Madam Chair. Maybe you know the answer or -- I believe you
18 do. This is an appropriation for \$275,000, but the spillways that
19 would receive that funding and that attention, my notes here
20 indicate that those have not yet been identified. And so, there's
21 going to be a County-wide assessment. My question is: If those --
22 No. 1, is that -- is that true, that they haven't been identified
23 yet?

24
25 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

26 Well, they're -- I think there's a lot I already identified --

27
28 **LEGISLATOR STERN:**

29 Yeah.

30
31 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

32 -- that probably will exceed the amount we're looking for now.

33
34 **LEGISLATOR STERN:**

35 Yeah. Well, I guess that's my question. If some have been
36 identified but not all have been identified, what's the -- what's
37 the basis for the \$275,000? Is that a number that we put -- have
38 in our budget for appropriation as a general rule on an annual
39 basis and then we add to that as --

40
41 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

42 I think this was --

43
44 **LEGISLATOR STERN:**

45 -- spillways are identified?

46
47 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

48 Yeah. This is specifically going to be targeted for Hubbard County
49 Park. There's a spillway that's more or less a coal berth and with
50 a road that goes over it that's starting to fail, and it needs
51 attention. And so, that's what this one will be targeted for.

52
53 **LEGISLATOR STERN:**

54 Okay. But there are -- can and most likely will be others that are
55 identified?

1 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

2 Additional, correct. We've been working with Public Works to
3 assess and identify other ones, but right now this is on the top
4 priority.

5
6 **LEGISLATOR STERN:**

7 All right. Thank you.
8

9 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

10 Okay. So, we have a motion and a second. All those in favor?
11 Opposed? Abstentions? **1410 is approved. (Vote: 5-0-0-0.)**
12

13 **Introductory Resolution 1411. Appropriating funds in connection**
14 **with the Removal of Toxic and Hazardous Materials in County Parks**
15 **(CP 7185). (County Executive) Parks and Recreation (LOT 5/16/17**

28 PRESENTATIONS

29
30
31 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

32 Okay. So, now we have a presentation. We have Ken Kindler here.
33 Ken is from the Long Island Greenbelt Trail Conference and the
34 Southampton Trails Preservation Society, and he will be making a
35 brief presentation and information about the trails, a trail
36 stewardship program. Welcome, Ken.
37

38 **MR. KINDLER:**

39 Thank you, Kara, for inviting me today.
40

41 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

42 Want to pull the microphone just a little bit closer to you.
43

44 **MR. KINDLER:**

45 Okay. Thank you, Kara, for inviting me today. I very much
46 appreciate the opportunity to speak to you all of you. My name is
47 Kenneth Kindler. I've been an advocate for Suffolk County's nature
48 trails for 26 years. I've led hundreds of hikes. I have advocated
49 for our trails on TV, radio, in newspapers, in magazines and on the
50 internet. I edited the book Short Nature Walks on Long Island, and
51 for many years wrote a weekly column about Suffolk County Trails
52 for Dan's Papers. In 1997, I established the first website for the
53 Long Island trails groups. I'm an active member of three trails
54 groups and sit on the board of directors of two of them. I have
55 attended multiple trail-building workshops, built approximately 50
56 miles of trails and directed and participated in blazing, cutting

1 and repairing hundreds of miles of trails. I have advocated for
2 trails by regular attendance at the Pine Barrens Commission, PLC,
3 and enforcement council meetings and many Town board meetings in
4 Southampton, Brookhaven and Riverhead. I've solicited and won
5 grants for trails while working for Suffolk County Parks Department
6 from 2009 to 2013. I built new trails and made existing ones more
7 inviting to gentle users. I am largely responsible for the
8 multimodality trails network in Manorville Hills County Park. I
9 facilitated the Paumanok Path Summit at Suffolk Community College
10 in 2004. I'm presently working as a trail steward for
11 Southampton's 54-mile section of the Paumanok Path.

12
13 Through all these experiences, I've become convinced that what is
14 preventing Suffolk County from having a truly successful trail
15 stewardship program is more robust support from the County. Trails
16 groups -- maybe I should pause right now. The reason I'm here is
17 because I see that the County is giving support through increasing
18 the penalties for illegal ATV use. I love the program for trying
19 to limit the dumping in our open -- natural open space. I mean,
20 this is the first time I've actually speaked in front of -- I've
21 actually spoken in front of the Parks & Recreation Committee in 26
22 years since I've started advocating for the trails. I feel like
23 this is the time -- this is when something can happen. The trails
24 groups have so many more projects they want to work on but hesitate
25 to do so for fear that they will be destroyed by ATV-driving
26 vandals. This vandalism to our trails is not only an assault
27 against nature. It's also an assault against the people who love
28 the trails and the people who create them at no cost to the
29 taxpayers. Many people are not aware of the full extent of the
30 damage, much less the enormous challenge we face in repairing and
31 preventing it. The trails groups have nowhere near enough
32 resources to do this without support from the County. That is why
33 I'm suggesting that we take action.

34
35 I am proposing the establishment of a Suffolk County Resource
36 Revitalization Area program. I have outlined the details of this
37 plan on the handout that you have in front of you. The Resource
38 Revitalization Areas would be posted with a sign clearly stating
39 the penalties. When a posted area is damaged by vandals, it must
40 be considered malicious mischief, and the penalty must reflect
41 that. Penalties must be severe enough to dissuade those who would
42 destroy a trail just for the fun of it. There needs to be a media
43 campaign that will inform and educate the public about these
44 revitalization areas. We need the support of the public in
45 protecting these places not just for ourselves but also for the
46 nature-loving tourists who will visit. The public needs to be
47 educated about how our natural open space and the trails into them
48 are necessary to protect our drinking water. We simply cannot
49 allow our trails to continue to be destroyed. Suffolk County can
50 be a leading innovator in this area. A working program here
51 through the establish of Resource Revitalization Areas could become
52 a model that would be copied in areas all around the country.

53
54 I'm not -- I'm not a public speaker even though I have had the
55 chance to talk in front of a lot of people a lot of times, and I
56 really -- I hate doing it, but if you ask me some questions I'll

1 feel a lot more comfortable.

2
3 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
4 Legislator Kennedy.

5
6 **LEGISLATOR KENNEDY:**

7 First, I'd like to thank you for taking care and creating additions
8 to our Greenbelt trails. I fight for the ones in my area
9 constantly, and I know that it takes a lot. So, thank you for
10 doing that. This group that you feel that the County should put
11 in, is it primarily a funding request?

12
13 **MR. KINDLER:**

14 It's -- well, okay. Simply stated, we've preserved somewhere near
15 200,000 square acres of land, and the trails groups have created
16 about 1,500 miles of trails. The damage, if you're as aware of it
17 as I am, is more than just a challenge. It's impossible. And it's
18 -- to try and confront all of that is -- it's just not something
19 that we can do. So, what I'm suggesting is that we take bite-size
20 pieces out of it. We take an area that we really care about, post
21 it. Once it's posted, if somebody goes in there and does damage to
22 it, then that raises the level of the infraction as far as I'm
23 concerned. I'm not a lawyer. I don't know, but I think we need to
24 come up with something that will make it a lot less easy for people
25 to go in and just for the joy of it to destroy a trail. Most
26 people aren't even aware -- I mean, you can walk on a trail, and it
27 can be a lovely experience, but I'll walk on the same trail, I'll
28 look at it and I'll see its death in the future because as soon as
29 these trails get worn down below the slope they catch the water.
30 Once they catch the water, it turns into those ravines that you are
31 looking at. We're confronting the death of our trail system, and
32 nobody seems to be appreciative of that fact. We need to do
33 something now, and it needs to have teeth in it. People -- people
34 can't feel that they can go in there and destroy these trails with
35 impunity. So, what I'm saying is we need to take pieces of trail,
36 pieces of property that we care about, post them and do
37 revitalization projects to -- we need to repair the trails, we need
38 to, you know, do the other things that are happening now with the
39 invasive species and, you know, care for a certain area of property
40 and, you know, if we -- if we're -- if we manage to get enough --
41 well, you know, I see with the -- this wonderful thing that we're
42 doing with dumping. It's in all the papers. People are becoming
43 aware that they have all of this natural area that's being
44 impacted. Now, if we could -- if we had these programs protected
45 by the County with some legal -- some -- with --

46
47 **LEGISLATOR KENNEDY:**
48 Teeth.

49
50 **MR. KINDLER:**

51 -- with penalties that would really matter to the people who might
52 consider doing this kind of damage, you know, we would have a
53 better chance at protecting our open space and our trails.

54
55 **LEGISLATOR KENNEDY:**

56 I understand. Do you think a majority of the wearing away of the

1 trails is due to ATVs?

2
3 **MR. KINDLER:**

4 A huge amount of it. I can explain. All trails when they're used
5 -- there's a term, having them loved to death. You know, if you
6 have hundreds of people walking on a trail, eventually they will
7 wear down, eventually, slowly. What the ATVs are doing is they're
8 accelerating this to a point where it can't be addressed. It's
9 overwhelming. If they weren't destroying these trails, we could
10 have -- I mean, I've rehabilitated miles of trail. It can be done
11 but not at the rate that it's happening to these trails. They're
12 all going to turn into those ravines that you saw on the slideshow.
13 So, yeah, if trails are constructed properly there's such a thing
14 as creating sustainable trails. If you create them properly, they
15 can last forever.

16
17 **LEGISLATOR KENNEDY:**

18 Okay. Let me just ask the Commissioner: ATVs aren't allowed in
19 the Greenbelt Trail, correct? I think not.

20
21 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

22 They're not allowed in any of our parks.

23
24 **LEGISLATOR KENNEDY:**

25 Okay. So then, it's more of an enforcement thing that needs to be
26 done if they're traveling consistently on the Greenbelt Trail, so.

27
28 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

29 Well, not all the Greenbelt Trails are ours, but we do have a task
30 force that's between New York State DEC, the Sheriff, Suffolk
31 County PD, our Park rangers and another two agencies possibly, and
32 every weekend we're out there, and we're constantly -- but it's,
33 you know, hundreds of thousands of acres.

34
35 **LEGISLATOR KENNEDY:**

36 Do we need more summer Parks police?

37
38 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

39 I'm sorry?

40
41 **LEGISLATOR KENNEDY:**

42 Do we need more summer Parks police?

43
44 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**

45 No. We're doing okay with it, but it's just a -- it's a large area
46 to patrol.

47
48 **LEGISLATOR KENNEDY:**

49 That's a yes. I know.

50
51 **MR. KINDLER:**

52 What my point is, that it needs to be a misdemeanor, not an
53 infraction. It needs to -- the laws have to have teeth in them.

54
55 **LEGISLATOR KENNEDY:**

56 I understand what you're saying. I'm going to check if when some

1 piece of land is posted if that's more enforcement and more -- and
2 we can -- we can always increase the fine by putting in a
3 resolution.

4
5 **MR. KINDLER:**

6 I feel -- I feel that it's an impossible thing for -- I mean, as an
7 infraction, they can't -- they can't pursue people who are doing
8 it. They can't go to people's houses when they follow them to the
9 houses. As an infraction, it has no teeth legally. What I'm
10 saying is there needs to -- we need to make the laws a little bit
11 more stringent because basically what's happening now, it's almost
12 like in feudal times a baron would have a certain piece of land and
13 he'd go out and he'd cull the herd. Basically, that's what we're
14 doing when we have those enforcement sting operations. They go
15 out, and they grab a few people, the slow people, the new people,
16 not the people who are out there regularly who know -- who have --
17 they create trails so that they can get away from enforcement.

18
19 **LEGISLATOR KENNEDY:**

20 Correct.

21
22 **MR. KINDLER:**

23 They know how to avoid being caught. There was one guy who has
24 been doing it for several decades, and they -- and just because
25 they had a running race and this guy was flushed out, they finally
26 caught him. This is the same guy who when I was walking on the
27 trails with a scout and his father and I took a picture of him, he
28 stopped, he grabbed a stick, and he threatened us. I mean, this is
29 the kind of thing -- those pictures, you see the kind of liability
30 that we have out there. These people are not very friendly
31 sometimes. You don't want to have that out there on the trails,
32 and I feel we really need to be more effective. I mean --

33
34 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

35 And there are some good ideas here about, you know, making sure
36 that access points are better, you know, the kissing gates and the
37 barriers that we can construct in some places that can prevent some
38 of the access points. And then electronic surveillance, you know,
39 we have some talk about that for dumping purposes. You know, we
40 should be continually looking into other ways to use electronic
41 surveillance to catch people who are harming our parks, but also
42 when it's clear that our parks are being accessed from contiguous
43 properties, you know, that we find a way to approach -- that's a
44 point on this, what you have here in front of us, to notify, you
45 know, the homeowners where ATVs may be coming from about their
46 liability and about the problem and really putting resources into
47 enforcement, which is both Suffolk County Police Department,
48 Suffolk County Parks Department and other, you know, other State
49 lands we're talking about here as well, and there are a lot of good
50 ideas that you have listed here, and I think that the Parks
51 Commissioner and I will sit down and talk about what might be
52 options. I had -- I wanted George to come in because I'm pretty
53 sure making something a misdemeanor requires State legislation.
54 So, like, we don't have the authority to do that.

1 **LEGISLATOR KENNEDY:**

2 No. The penal code.

3
4 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

5 Right. So, I'm waiting for George or someone from our counsel's
6 office to answer that question, but we could -- and I have on the
7 Parks dumping, I have approached our State representatives where
8 we're trying to create felonies in certain instances. The County
9 can't do that, but we have been approaching our State
10 representatives and working with them, and this could be an
11 instance where we do that as well.

12
13 **MR. KINDLER:**

14 If this is a coordinated effort supported by the County, having
15 them post it -- I mean, as I mentioned, I pretty much created that
16 park in Manorville Hills. I brought all the volunteers in there,
17 and we managed to depress the damage in that area quite
18 significantly, but I couldn't -- I couldn't get for some reason --
19 I mean, we put in those kissing gates in all the right places to
20 impede their use, and after a few years there was hardly any damage
21 going on in there because of the increased use because there was a
22 really nice trail system that was being used by the public, and of
23 course they don't like being in places where there is a lot of
24 people. So, that worked rather well except I couldn't get
25 permission to block off the back of that property from Brookhaven.
26 So, I blocked off the whole front of the property, and the trails
27 all started healing, the people were coming in there, the ATVs were
28 staying out, and then slowly the ATVs came in through the back,
29 Brookhaven, not County property. County worked with me totally.
30 Nick Gibbons gave me complete support, and it was because of him
31 that this was such a successful project, but I needed to block off
32 the back. So, they weren't coming in the front anymore. They used
33 to just totally tear that place up. It was ATV central. And after
34 a while, there were hardly any ATVs in there, but there was still a
35 back door open at Halsey Manor Road, and I couldn't get permission
36 to block that off with three gates.

37
38 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

39 So, I think -- I think that -- and, Legislator Kennedy, I don't
40 know if you were about to add, but I think that, you know, we will
41 sit down with the Commissioner, maybe a couple of us who are
42 interested -- from this Committee who are interested in this and go
43 through some of your suggestions. Our counsel has just arrived,
44 and just quickly, one of the recommendations that came up was --
45 where is it? Was about making it a misdemeanor instead of an
46 infraction for the ATV use, correct? So, that's not something that
47 we can do at our level of government, or is it?

48
49 **MR. NOLAN:**

50 We could. But I do know that we just amended our ATV law very
51 recently and made it stronger. I don't know exactly what the
52 penalties are now, but we, the Legislature, has the authority to
53 define certain actions as misdemeanors. We can't --

54
55 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

56 Okay. So, it's felonies.

1 **MR. NOLAN:**
2 Felonies, yes.

3
4 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
5 We were talking about felonies on the dumping. So, that's why I
6 thought it was State. So, maybe we should just revisit what the --
7 what we did recently and look to see if this is something that
8 we'll consider or not, and the Committee will discuss that.

9
10 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**
11 Right. I think it had to do with the impounding of the vehicles,
12 of the ATVs.

13
14 **MR. KINDLER:**
15 After a third infraction. Have we been able to interface the
16 databases between the different enforcements?

17
18 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**
19 Absolutely.

20
21 **MR. KINDLER:**
22 We have?

23
24 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**
25 Well, we do all the impounds. So, we have them all. So, we have
26 the -- we have the data, and we've been following it.

27
28 **MR. KINDLER:**
29 So, if --

30
31 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**
32 I think it's after the second infraction. I'm not positive.

33
34 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
35 Yeah. We -- I believe the law made it go from three to two in the
36 second infraction, and you had brought up when we met, Ken, about
37 the database issue and that if, you know, if a Suffolk County
38 Police Department Officer pulls someone over versus a Parks
39 Department official versus the Sheriff's Department official are we
40 -- versus a Southampton Town Police, you know. Are we all talking
41 to each other so that a second infraction is really an ATV user's
42 second infraction, not just the second one by the unit?

43
44 **COMMISSIONER BERDOLT:**
45 Individually, what the Towns do, I don't think that's going on.
46 I'm not positive, but as the joint task force is, yes.

47
48 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**
49 Okay. So, we'll talk more about that. So, thank you, Ken. We
50 will -- we will meet with the Parks Commissioner and keep you in
51 the loop, and we'll keep talking. I really appreciate your
52 presentation, and clearly there was a lot of interest because
53 people stayed to listen, and, you know, we care about our parks,
54 and we care about our trails, and we thank you for all that you've
55 done, your personal efforts to protect our trails and build them.
56 Thank you.

1 **MR. KINDLER:**

2 The trails could be so much nicer if we didn't have to contend with
3 this.

4
5 **CHAIRPERSON HAHN:**

6 Yes. Yes, we all agree. Thank you.

7
8 Okay, with that, there's no further business before us, and we are
9 adjourned.
