THE MEETING WAS CALLED TO ORDER AT 9:43 AM

CHAIRPERSON STERN:

Good morning everyone and welcome to the Veterans Committee of the Suffolk County Legislature. I ask everybody to please rise and join in the Pledge of Allegiance led by Legislator Barraga.

SALUTATION

Please remain standing to join us in a moment of silence as we remember too many of our servicemen who recently lost their lives and were victims of the Marine plane crash on July 10, 2017 in Mississippi: Marine Corporal Daniel Baldassare, Captain Sean E. Elliott, Major Caine M. Goyette, Gunnery Sergeant Brendan C. Johnson, Sergeant Julian M. Kevianne, Sergeant Owen J. Lennon, Corporal Collin J. Schaff, Staff Sergeant Joshua Snowden, Staff Sergeant Robert H. Cox, Staff Sergeant William J. Kundrat, Sergeant Chad E. Jenson, Sergeant Talon R. Leach, Sergeant Joseph J. Murray, Sergeant Dietrich A. Schmieman, Gunnery Sergeant Mark Hopkins, Navy Petty Officer Second Class Ryan Lohrey; and all of our brave men and women fighting for our freedoms overseas.

MOMENT OF SILENCE OBSERVED

Thank you. Okay. Again, thank you everybody for joining us this morning.

PUBLIC PORTION

Our first speaker -- Carol, come on up. While Carol's coming on up, I just want to make sure all of my colleagues have received copy of correspondence to the Nassau County -- from -- I'm sorry -- the Nassau County Legislature; correct?

MS. KOLAR:  
Yes.

CHAIRPERSON STERN:  
Okay. Thank you.

MS. KOLAR:  
Thank you. In June the Department of Veterans Affairs published fact sheet on veterans healthcare highlighting the problems they face with the funding system currently utilized to pay for Community Care. They stated they would be working with Congress to define and build an integrated healthcare network including a Community Care Program that is simple to understand, easy to administer, and meets the needs of veterans and their families. This would include streamlining the funding on VA Community Care into one account or ensuring flexibility between accounts.

This August our committee will be visiting the offices of the federal representatives that are listed on that letter and also the letter that Suffolk -- that your Committee sent, you know. We'll be visiting them on their break to advocate for expanding eligibility criteria for Community Care to include all veterans.

1 We believe the funding issue can most easily be addressed by  
2 extending the Medicare coverage to our veterans and making the VA a  
3 provider and also a payer as recommended by the Commission on Care  
4 last year.

5  
6 And we hope this Committee, and that's why we're here today, to ask  
7 this Committee and seek their support to contact our federal  
8 representatives and strongly support extending services to care to  
9 all veterans with the funding issue being addressed by extending  
09:45AM 10 the very successful and well-established Medicare program to all  
11 our veterans.

12  
13 So that's why we came today, because we continue to pursue this.  
14 We think it's the easiest, the simplest. And everybody is looking  
15 for the easy solution finally. So we figure that, you know, going  
16 into that funding that Medicare has and accessing that would be the  
17 best bet for the veterans.

18  
19 So, what do you think? (Laughter) Can we count on your support?

21 CHAIRPERSON STERN:

22 First, of all thank you as always for coming. And I'm sure  
23 everybody would agree particularly now as we are knee deep in the  
24 discussion about healthcare for everyone in our country, that  
25 providing the best, the most efficient, the most cost-effective  
26 delivery of healthcare services to our veterans needs to remain  
27 very much on the top of the priority list. None of us can allow it  
28 to get pushed down towards the bottom and lost as we're having this  
29 very important national debate. So we will certainly continue to  
09:46AM 30 make sure that we work with you and let our federal representatives  
31 know that as they're continuing to have this conversation, that  
32 this is a critical issue that cannot be lost in the shuffle. Thank  
33 you.

35 MS. KOLAR:

36 Okay, thank you.

37  
38 CHAIRPERSON STERN:

39 Bill? Bill, did you want to come up?

41 MR. KOKELL:

42 Okay. Thank you very much, people. I appreciate you take this  
43 time. I just wanted to share my experience with the VA, which I  
44 have already with my recent experience after having a problem with  
45 my heart. And then with what I went through with that, the VA.  
46 I've explained it here already.

47  
48 I just want to talk a little bit about my only disability. And I  
49 understand that there's -- there's a faction of people or a side of  
09:47AM 50 people, I understand everybody has opinions, that stuff is -- could  
51 be perceived as not patriotic; or like our recent President George  
52 W. Bush said, either you're with us or against us. And I'm  
53 certainly not unpatriotic when I talk about healthcare for  
54 veterans.

55  
56 My own disability in 1960, between '60 and '63 I was exposed to

1 every weapon they had at that time with no protection. And I was  
2 discharged, you know, got out of the service, got on my way. And a  
3 couple of years later I was having tinnitus, but I had what they  
4 call mortar blast tinnitus. And you have -- like a mortar goes off  
5 in my head. And that happens on a daily basis.

6  
7 So I went back to -- I think, '65 or '66, I went back into New York  
8 and they said *there's nothing we can do for you*. And they gave me  
9 a 10% disability for tinnitus, which is \$18 a month at that time.  
09:49AM 10 And then I just went on my way and I never had a problem with the  
11 VA. If you asked me how the VA was, I would have said fine, it  
12 was; and probably for most things it probably is.

13  
14 Recently I read an article by the American Tinnitus Association and  
15 they said that as a result of tinnitus, you can suffer from  
16 depression, anxiety, which I'm being treated for by the Veterans  
17 Administration, dementia, loss of memory, as a result of just  
18 tinnitus, never mind the fact that I have the mortar blast. The VA  
19 -- the VA -- I go to one provider, psychiatrist, I guess, and she's  
09:50AM 20 a very nice person and everything. And I asked her, I said, does  
21 -- what I have, could it result in depression and anxiety? She  
22 said no; just like that, no. And I just want to say one more thing  
23 that -- that I have no other doctor to go to. I have no other  
24 place to turn. So, thank you.

25  
26 CHAIRPERSON STERN:

27 Well, thank you. Thank you for being with us today. Of course, as  
28 always, thank you for your service and all of your continued  
29 efforts on this important issue. And we'll continue to discuss it  
09:50AM 30 along the way. Thank you.

31  
32 Okay. I do not have any other cards. Is there anybody else from  
33 the public that would like to address the Committee? Seeing none,  
34 Director Ronayne.

35  
36 DIRECTOR RONAYNE:

37 Good morning, Mr. Chairman, members. As always, thank you for the  
38 invitation to be here today.

39  
09:51AM 40 Really not a great deal to report on today other than tis the  
41 season for us. We're very engaged at this point, typically during  
42 this time of year, in outreach efforts. We're out in the  
43 community. We're participating in community-based events. And  
44 just making every effort to increase awareness of the agency; the  
45 services available; and encourage folks to come in and meet with  
46 us, allow us to -- allow us to serve them.

47  
48 One example would be this week on Friday is the annual Soldier's  
49 Ride in Babylon, which I think it's -- I don't want to hazard a  
09:52AM 50 guess, but it's a great many people who participate in the ride.  
51 But the spectators and supporters far outnumber the number of  
52 participants. So it's a -- these are great opportunities for us to  
53 get out there and sell the product as it were, to help folks to  
54 better understand what we have available for them in the community.  
55 So that's really the crux of what we've been doing beyond the  
56 normal operations of the offices. And taking care of -- taking

1 care of clients as we engage them.

2

3 CHAIRPERSON STERN:

4 And, Director, I'm hoping for my colleagues on the Committee this  
5 morning, who -- well, two issues: One, the start of the good  
6 things going down at our Traffic Violations Bureau, the Veterans  
7 Traffic Court, maybe if you can speak to that and bring the  
8 Committee up to speed. And then yesterday we had a very good  
9 encouraging day at the Sitings Committee; so I'm wondering if you  
10 could bring, again, members of the Committee up to speed on what's  
11 going on there and how that will hopefully proceed.

13 DIRECTOR RONAYNE:

14 Absolutely, thank you. Yes, we -- the Suffolk County Traffic  
15 Parking and Violations Bureau recently launched its veterans docket  
16 day. And we participated. We have been supporting the effort  
17 working with the traffic court administration to launch the  
18 program. And based on the one day that it has been in session thus  
19 far, it seems to have been very successful. They saw 26 veterans  
20 that day who were presenting with a variety of traffic and moving  
21 violations issues.

23 One of the things that, I think, probably would be most beneficial  
24 to the veterans participating, and while the points reduction  
25 considerations, the fine reductions considerations are all  
26 meaningful, what the court has done is they've worked with our  
27 office to provide a gathering of providers, community-based  
28 providers to assemble in the media room adjacent to the courtroom  
29 that they're using for the veterans docket day and allow the  
30 veterans and their families, when they come in prior to meeting  
31 with their prosecutor and prior to seeing the judge, to meet with  
32 and discuss as appropriate as -- based upon who is in the room with  
33 the various providers to access services that they may not be  
34 accessing, to enhance services that they may be receiving already.  
35 And we've had a good amount of feedback already from the -- from  
36 some of the veterans who participated in the court.

38 I know Legislator Barraga was with us on the day that we launched.  
39 And, you know, one of the things that I think is particularly  
40 important is that there's an empathy, there's a particular  
41 understanding of some of the unique characteristics of veterans and  
42 veteran behavior in the court.

44 The judge who presides over these proceedings is an army national  
45 guard veteran. He's currently a coast guard axillary man, but he  
46 is an army national guard veteran. And having a veteran on that  
47 bench, I think, goes a long way toward encouraging the veterans who  
48 participate in the court to participate and to engage -- to engage  
49 the court. So it's been very successful; but, again, it's convened  
50 a total of one time. So going forward we have high hopes.

52 CHAIRPERSON STERN:

53 I think that was really the -- many important elements to the  
54 program, but what I find and found most intriguing, most compelling  
55 and hopefully what is going to be one of the -- the most important  
56 impacts is going to be having yet another opportunity for outreach.

1 And we all the time around this horseshoe, this Committee and this  
2 Legislature, you know, is frustrated how we have these wonderful  
3 services here at the County level we have to offer our veterans and  
4 their families, and all too often so many of our local veterans go  
5 without that assistance because they just don't know when there is  
6 that disconnect.

7  
8 And so having to appear before the court but being offered the  
9 opportunity to participate and receive these services, an important  
09:57AM 10 point of contact. And we're really hoping for some wonderful  
11 things, not just in terms of their issues before the court, but in  
12 many cases I'm sure that we will have many individuals who are in  
13 need of services and need of assistance and they will be finding a  
14 way to receive that help along the way. So, yes, we're looking  
15 forward to some really, really good things.

16  
17 DIRECTOR RONAYNE:

18 One of the benefits that we expect to see from the court is, you  
19 know, we've had a number of discussions on this -- on this topic.  
09:57AM 20 And one of the things that we tend to see in this group, in this  
21 population, is suspended driver's licenses or driver's licenses  
22 where the next court appearance resulting in points being assessed  
23 will result in a suspension. And this court is very sensitive to  
24 that particular issue because the ripple effect of those  
25 suspensions is tremendous. And it goes to employment; it goes to  
26 housing.

27  
28 So if we can capture that moment in time where we have the ability  
29 to do something about that driver's license, we have potentially  
09:58AM 30 the ability to influence maintaining employment or obtaining  
31 employment, being able to continue to pay the rent and so forth.  
32 But I want to stress that this is not a -- this is not a pass. You  
33 don't come in, show a DD 214 and your infractions are forgiven.  
34 There are a variety of diversions programs; fines are still being  
35 levied; there are expectations on the part of the court for the  
36 veterans receiving consideration from the court.

37  
38 So, you know, we're excited. We think that this has tremendous  
39 potential. I was with Paul Margiotta who runs the Traffic Parking  
09:58AM 40 Violations Bureau yesterday. And he has already been contacted by  
41 a number of outside municipalities, municipalities from outside of  
42 Suffolk County, who are aware of what we believe to be the first in  
43 the nation, effort of this type.

44  
45 CHAIRPERSON STERN:

46 Which makes it very exciting as well. And I remember, and just for  
47 the record to also thank Kenny Rosenblum of Touro Law School who is  
48 a tremendous advocate for quite sometime on this issue. And I  
49 remember so many of our round table discussions in years past. And  
09:59AM 50 this consistently was an important issue that he continued to  
51 raise. And so while we expect good things going forward for our  
52 veterans, it's also very exciting and we can also be very proud  
53 here in Suffolk County that once again, especially when it comes to  
54 providing much needed services for our veterans and family members,  
55 that we continue to lead the way. And this is yet another example  
56 of how we are first in the country.

1 DIRECTOR RONAYNE:

2 And Kenny Rosenblum has been a tremendous resource. This has been  
3 a particularly important issue to him. He's advocated for a number  
4 of years, specifically to the driver's license issue and through  
5 the Veterans Legal Services Support Program at Touro Law School.  
6 Ken Rosenblum and Craig Bruno are doing a terrific job. I can tell  
7 you that they're very, very busy. They were very, very busy on  
8 that first day. So if any attorneys among you would like to  
9 volunteer your time and assist veterans in this court, you'd be  
10:00AM 10 more than welcome. We'll make sure we have a table and chair for  
11 you.  
12

13 As the Chairman mentioned, we had a meeting yesterday here in the  
14 horseshoe of the Sitings and Memorial Committee. And we presented  
15 and were delighted to receive unanimous approval of that committee  
16 to move forward with the creation and installation of a Beirut  
17 veterans monument at Armed Forces Plaza. This is something that  
18 Legislator Stern has been working toward for really several years  
19 now. And we're delighted that it is now moved to this point.  
20

21 We have a couple of renderings. We have a draft rendering from our  
22 architect as to what the -- potentially what the monument would  
23 look like. And we've already been discussing meeting with  
24 suppliers and going forward. Outside of the County involvement in  
25 this, we do have at this time at least one family of a KIA Marine  
26 from Beirut who is actively advocating in the community for this  
27 monument. And we're very excited that in addition to being able to  
28 do this, which I think is not only long overdue but highly  
29 appropriate, that we will be able to do this at no cost to the  
10:01AM 30 County, which is always a good thing when we can come here and tell  
31 you that.  
32

33 CHAIRPERSON STERN:

34 Anybody for the Director? Okay. Director, as always, thank you.  
35

36 DIRECTOR RONAYNE:

37 Thank you. And I'd just like to say welcome back to Legislator  
38 Kennedy. We're happy to see you here with us today and it's good  
39 to know you're okay.
