32 And now I'd like to call up the Patchogue-Medford High School

41 Many thanks to my friends from the Patchogue American Legion
42 Post 111 for presenting the colors this morning. And we're going
43 to have another song by our choir this morning. The students will

50 Thank you to the very talented students, and under the leadership
51 of Mark Stuckey, who is the Director of Art and Music and Cultural
52 Arts for the Patchogue-Medford School District, and to the School
53 District for allowing their students to join us today.

54

55 And at this time, I'd like to call up Pastor Anthony Palella from
56 the Medford Assembly of God. And Pastor Anthony is going to be

1 providing us with our invocation this morning.

2
3 Pastor Anthony Palella is a native New Yorker and has lived on Long
4 Island since the age of three. He is married with two daughters,
5 and had become Senior Pastor of the Medford Assembly of God in
6 October of 1997. He has seen the church grow from three people to
7 now about 1,000, who call it their home.

8
9 Pastor Anthony is an author, and also the overseeing Presbyter for
10 the Assemblies of God Churches in both Suffolk and Nassau Counties.
11 He takes special pride in the Compassionate Care Ministries of the
12 church. Their outreach to the homeless, children and foster care,
13 children with special needs, law enforcement, and soldiers
14 struggling with PTSD are their priorities.

15
16 And I can say I have had many personal interactions with Pastor
17 Anthony. He does a wonderful job. He runs a Hope Day once a year
18 in our community, where he hands out much needed goods to
19 residents, whether it's backpacks for kids for their school
20 supplies, or haircuts, or shoes, or those kind of things that
21 people sometimes don't think about. And he does now outreach not
22 just in my community, but also into Brentwood, in Legislator
23 Martinez' community, with his church and many other churches. So
24 we thank him very much for all of his dedication, helping the
25 people who most need it in our community.

26
27 And, at this time, I'd like to ask Pastor Anthony to give us our
28 invocation.

29
30 **PASTOR ANTHONY:**

31 This makes me feel like Captain Kirk. Could I use this?

32
33 **LEG. CALARCO:**

34 You can try this one. It doesn't always work.

35
36 **PASTOR ANTHONY:**

37 I love America. I love those who protect our country, I love those
38 who lead our country. I'm so grateful to have had a relationship
39 with Legislator Calarco and Legislator Martinez. I'm looking
40 forward with Legislator Hahn to do some work in the Port Jeff area
41 as well.

42
43 And as I stand here before you today, I think about the genesis of
44 our government. I think about the fact that our Founding Fathers
45 looked into the scriptures to find a checks and balances, so that
46 this government that leads would be able to have to look each other
47 in the eye and be accountable.

48
49 There's a verse found in Isaiah 33, Chapter -- Chapter 33, Verse
50 22, and it says, "The Lord is our judge, the Lord is our lawgiver,
51 and the Lord is our King." And it was our Founding Fathers that
52 found the three branches of government in that verse for us to be
53 led by, even to this day. The Lord is our lawgiver. Today, we
54 have our Legislative branch of Suffolk County getting together to
55 make some vital decisions, decisions that will affect all of us.
56 And we want to pray that God will give them wisdom, since he is the

1 ultimate lawgiver, that we would look to him to give them wisdom,
2 to give them the unity that they need, and to give them the
3 direction that their steps have to take to make sure that we, the
4 People of Suffolk County, would be led in a direction that would be
5 pleasing to God.

6
7 So with that said, if we could just bow our heads and go the Lord
8 in prayers.

9
10 11:18AM Heavenly Father, we come before you today, recognizing that you are
11 the creator of all, that you have give life, and that you give
12 direction to those that you have wonderfully and fearfully made.

13
14 I pray, Lord, God, for this gathering today. I pray, Lord, for
15 these wonderful men and women that you have called. Yes, they've
16 been elected, but you have called them, Lord, God. You have put
17 them in the seats that they have. The authority that they have has
18 been given by you to them. And I pray that with character and
19 integrity, with no selfishness behind their decisions, but
20 11:19AM selflessness for the people of Suffolk County, they would make
21 decisions, they would make sure that their elections would be done
22 with integrity and with clear thought, Lord, God. That they would
23 stand together as one in decisions to the best of their abilities.

12 Good morning. Thank you very much for the honor of coming here
13 once again to give a few brief remarks at the start of a new year.
14 I hope everyone had a wonderful holiday season with you and your
15 families. And I know we all keep in our thoughts and prayers our
16 colleague, Steve Stern. Wonderful remarks this morning by the
17 Pastor. Thank you.

20 This Legislature is in my view very good hands with the leadership
21 of our Presiding Officer, DuWayne Gregory, and our Deputy Presiding
22 Officer, Rob Calarco. I also want to acknowledge and congratulate
23 our Majority Leader, Kara Hahn, Minority Leader, Kevin McCaffrey,
24 and all of my colleagues in the Suffolk County Legislature.

25 For the past five years, I've been proud to work in partnership
26 with this Legislature to undertake the hard work needed to move
27 Suffolk County forward. Together we've tackled many issues, many
28 of which have plagued our County for decades. Working together,
29 Suffolk County government today is more than 1200 positions smaller
30 than it was just five years ago, and we continue to take the tough
31 steps necessary to put Suffolk County on strong fiscal footing.
32

33 I'm pleased that just a few weeks ago the Legislature
34 overwhelmingly supported a number of critical economic development
35 projects. We sent a strong important message to communities
36 throughout our County that we will support community-based
37 planning, particularly when it comes to creating the kind of
38 vibrant downtowns centered around transit that we need to retain
39 our young people and create high-paying jobs in Suffolk County.

41 Last year, this Legislature supported my nominee for Police
42 Commissioner, and I'm proud to say that we have leadership in the
43 Suffolk County Police Department which is worthy of the brave men
44 and women who put the uniform on every day. Under Commissioner Tim
45 Sini and our Leadership Team, crime is down from already record
46 lows, and our relationships with both communities and other levels
47 of government have never been stronger. And I'm pleased that Chief
48 Cameron's program to register alarms, supported by this
49 Legislature, has resulted in a dramatic decrease in false alarms,
50 which means that our police resources are focused on fighting
51 crimes, not responding to false alarms. Once again, our police
52 continue to make one of America's safest counties even safer.
53

54 And this Legislature has worked hand in hand with our water quality
55 experts to modernize Suffolk County's Sanitary Code, much of which
56 hasn't been touched since the 1970s, bringing it into the 21st

1 Century. I'm confident that we will continue working together to
2 make tremendous progress to reverse the trend of declining water
3 quality and reclaim our water.

4
5 And I look forward to working with this Legislature in 2017 to
6 develop an understanding of the causes and to implement the reforms
7 necessary to fully restore integrity and public confidence in our
8 Criminal Justice System. We have many challenges in this County
9 and in this region, but we also have great opportunities, great
10 assets, and I believe great public servants who are ready and able
11 to work together to meet those challenges. And, by the way, that
12 is exactly what the public demands of us.

13
14 Suffolk County voters are not interested in electing Democrats or
15 Republicans. The same voters will vote for a Republican President
16 and a Democratic U.S. Senator, a Republican State Senator and a
17 Democratic Assemblyman, a Republican Supervisor and a Democratic
18 Legislator. That's not because they're confused, it's because
19 they're more interested in electing problem-solvers who are going
20 to work for them than the letter that comes behind someone's name.
21 They've entrusted all of us with a great responsibility to work on
22 their behalf, and together to build a stronger Suffolk County.

23
24 Congratulations, and I look forward to continuing our work with
25 you, our work together to build a stronger Suffolk County. Thank
26 you.

31 Okay. Now we will go to the election of the Presiding Officer, and
32 I will accept nominations for the office of Presiding Officer. And
33 at this time, I'll recognize Legislator Rob Calarco for the first
34 nomination.

35
36 **LEG. CALARCO:**

37 It is my honor to nominate DuWayne Gregory to continue as our
38 Presiding Officer.

39
40 Over the course of the last three years, DuWayne has effectively
41 led this body and our County through some very difficult
42 situations. With each problem, he has sought out input and advice
43 from the different members of this body, be they newly elected or
44 veterans, in the majority or in the minority. He has always sought
45 consensus when possible, but placed governing this County in the
46 best manner possible as first and foremost. And throughout this he
47 has done so in a manner that has always emphasized respect for each
48 of our respective point of views and opinions.

49
50 He has defended the integrity of this body as an independent branch
51 of government, charged with deliberating and making policy. I have
52 seen him stand up for many of us, even at times where I don't think
53 he necessarily agreed with us. And this is what I think is a true
54 sign of leadership, the ability to not only respect, but stand up
55 for his colleagues when needed, to always reach out with a phone
56 call to talk issues through, to take counsel from others and still

1 hold true to one's beliefs. DuWayne has exhibited these
2 characteristics, and he certainly has my full confidence, and I
3 hope all of yours, to continue as our Presiding Officer.

4
5 **ACTING P.O. GREGORY:**

6 Thank you, Rob. Now I'll recognize Legislator Kara Hahn for a
7 second.

8
9 **LEG. HAHN:**

10 Thank you. Ditto, obviously, to everything Rob said.

11
12 *(*Laughter*)*

13
14 DuWayne Gregory began his tenure as Presiding Officer in 2014 on
15 the heels of a crippling recession that put tremendous strain on
16 the County budget. Governing in good times is easier than in hard
17 times. Hard times like this demand we balance the needs of the
18 County's 1.4 million constituents with the need for extraordinary
19 fiscal restraint.

20
21 During these tough three years two things have stood out about
22 Presiding Officer Gregory. He is a man of honor, and he's right on
23 the issues. He's a trustworthy guy, he's a straight shooter.
24 DuWayne can be counted on to stand by people when they need him.
25 He has thrown his support behind struggling families, single
26 parents, women escaping domestic violence, veterans and the
27 elderly. At the same time, he has encouraged projects like the
28 Ronkonkoma Hub, Wyandanch Rising, redevelopment efforts in
29 downtowns like Patchogue, projects that have tremendous economic
30 potential.

31
32 In times of crisis there's nothing more critical than a leader one
33 can take at his word and trust to have your back. DuWayne Gregory
34 is that kind of man. And so it is with pride that I second the
35 nomination of my friend, DuWayne Gregory, to continue his tenure as
36 Presiding Officer of the Suffolk County Legislature.

54 In his relatively short time here at the Legislature, Legislator
55 McCaffrey has shown keen ability to lead not only within our
56 caucus, at times when sometimes our caucus is -- has divergent

1 points of view, but he's also shown an ability to lead in this
2 body, to vote in favor of resolutions that make sense for our
3 County, to vote in favor of resolutions that support our County's
4 infrastructure, while at the same time recognizing that our County
5 is under historic fiscal challenges. It's this ability to discern
6 between those policies that place our County in a position to, as
7 the County Executive says quite often, move forward, but do so in a
8 way that's fiscally responsible. His ability to lead at a time of
9 great fiscal challenge, that I am proud to place the name of

27 has two daughters and both of them have just graduated college.
28 One's moving to Florida, one's moving to New Jersey, and the reason
29 is she can't afford to buy a house here. And he went over, he went
11:33AM 30 over the litany of fees and burdens we've put on the taxpayers of
31 this County.

33 And people don't realize, that they put their heads down and say,
34 "Oh, it's going to be okay," but it's not going to be okay, because
35 if we're losing two highly educated people amongst, as you'll see
36 coming up in the next couple of weeks, about 185,000 more people
37 leaving New York City -- New York State, we have serious problems.
38 So we need tough decisions being made here and they're not being
39 made.

25 support it needs to continue its fine work in the coming year.
26

27 We will once again hold the line on General Fund property taxes for
28 the eleventh straight year in a row. We will continue to battle
29 homelessness, especially for our returning veterans.
11:43AM 30

31 We made a serious effort to reach out to young millennials with the
32 formation of our Next Generation Advisory Council. That effort
33 will continue and expand in 2017.
34

35 We will continue to make Suffolk County more transparent. In the
36 past year, we expanded our live coverage on the internet of our
37 General Meetings, both here and in Riverhead. And under
38 legislation sponsored by Deputy Presiding Officer Rob Calarco, we
11:43AM 39 established the Open Data website, which makes a vast amount of our
40 County data available quickly and easily to all residents.
41

42 But the centerpiece of my priorities for the coming year is
43 continue to do all we can to bolster the middle class in Suffolk
44 County. One critical aspect of that effort is to support the
45 Suffolk Community College. That is where students can get training
46 they need to get good jobs that will allow them to stay here in
47 Suffolk County.
48

11:44AM 49 In hopes of providing the College and its students some financial
50 surety going into the a future, a panel I formed, including the
51 Suffolk County Community College officials, myself and other County
52 officials, has drawn up a five-year financial plan for the College.
53 That plan is currently under review by our Office of Budget Review.
54

55 We also need to continue our support of transit-oriented
56

1 development projects that are regionally significant, like
2 Wyandanch Rising and the Ronkonkoma Hub. Those two projects will
3 create affordable housing for our young people, and their location
4 at transit hubs will free those young people from the necessity of
5 buying a vehicle. And those projects will create hundreds of
6 construction jobs and more than 100 permanent jobs when completed.

7
8 So thank you for your time and attention as we at the Suffolk
9 County Legislature begin a new year. And, again, thank you all for
10 your support.

11
12 (**Applause**)
13

14 Okay. Next is Introductory Resolution No. 1, election of the
15 Deputy Presiding Officer. I will accept nominations for the office
16 of Deputy Presiding Officer. I will now recognize Legislator
17 Spencer for the purpose of our first nomination.

18
19 **LEG. SPENCER:**

20 Thank you, Mr. Presiding Officer. And congratulations on your
21 reelection. I share your vision and look forward to working with
22 you.

23
24 During the election for our Presiding Officer, there was a second
25 nomination for Kevin McCaffrey, and we saw a vote that I really
26 appreciated, and that is the voice that we have in this Legislature
27 that offers a balance on both sides of the aisle. And I understand
28 the concern and I take those concerns very seriously every day.

29
30 One thing that I've learned, though, as a doctor is that sometimes
31 we don't see the healing, but it is occurring, and sometimes it's
32 slow and we have to reassure ourselves that we're on the right
33 track. And that's why it gives me great privilege to nominate Rob
34 Calarco for Deputy Presiding Officer.

35
36 One thing about Rob is that he exhibits wisdom beyond his years,
37 although he is one of the youngest members of this Legislature. I
38 think that he's been around in a variety of different roles, and he
39 takes the time to study and to learn the delicate balance that it
40 takes to be a fine representative of the people, but also a leader
41 amongst colleagues. I've seen him mature over the years. He
42 offers a steady hand, he's focused, he's got a great temperament,
43 but he really has a depth of knowledge that is absolutely amazing.

44
45 And I think that although we can look at this economy and see
46 what's going wrong, and I saw something early this morning where it
47 had indicated that over the last eight years we've seen over 125%
48 growth in our market. We've seen steady decrease of unemployment,
49 we've seen jobs created year after year, but yet we've seen great
50 losses on one side of the aisle, and that is that people are
51 hurting and people are hurting right now. But there are also
52 critical functions that we do every day, and families that rely on
53 us, and there's infrastructure, and Legislator Calarco understands
54 this. I.

55
56 I don't think it's any accident that he happens to represent the

1 district in Patchogue that is the blueprint for our future.
2 Although a lot of credit is given on the town level, I do think
3 that Rob, his leadership and some of the things he's represented,
4 has played a great role in that success.

5
6 I've seen many examples of Rob's leadership as we've dealt with
7 very difficult decisions. And I've seen his ability to be able to
8 reach out, to compromise, to back off his own position for what he
9 feels is best for our County. He represents his constituents with
10 pride and with honor, but, at the same time, he has a greater
11 vision of what the entire County needs.

12
13 He's been a friend to me. He's always had an open door. As a
14 Majority Leader and as a Deputy Presiding Officer, he continues to
15 grow in his leadership abilities. So with that said, it gives me
16 great honor to nominate Rob Calarco for Deputy Presiding Officer
17 once again.

18
19 **LEG. CALARCO:**

20 Thank you.

21
22 **P.O. GREGORY:**

23 Excellent. For the purposes of a second nomination, I will
24 recognize Legislator Monica Martinez.

25
26 **LEG. MARTINEZ:**

27 Thank you. I am also pleased to -- pleased and honored, actually,
28 to second the nomination for my colleague, Rob Calarco, as Deputy
29 Presiding Officer of the Suffolk County Legislature. He's proven
30 to be an able leader and honest broker to maintain the civility and
31 order of this body.

32
33 To me, Rob has been more than just a Deputy Presiding Officer, but
34 a friend. There have been issues in which I may not have been in
35 favor of, and I've spoken to him about my reservations. What I
36 appreciate he has done with me, and I'm sure with my other
37 colleagues, is provide information based on facts and not based on
38 emotions, and he has always supported the decisions that I have
39 made. He has also been very supportive in assuring that my
40 district has the necessary resources that our families, but
41 especially our children, need.

42
43 Are we losing our children to other states or to our fiscal
44 constraints? Yes. But I know that we're losing our children to
45 gang violence and drug epidemic. And I know that you have been
46 completely supportive of my district in making sure that we get the
47 resources needed, not only for our families, but for your children.
48 And to me, I cannot have anyone better than that, knowing that I
49 have you in my corner to protect my district as well. And not only
50 my district, but I know that you represent a district similar to
51 mine, and that you yourself have encountered situations that have
52 affected the County as a whole, and you understand that. And not
53 too many people can sympathize nor empathize with that, and for
54 that I thank you.

55
56 And I know that there have been times that I've taken you to the

1 back, because I'm mad about a certain vote that we have to take,
2 and I really appreciate the fact that you just -- you're there not
3 only as a Deputy Presiding Officer, but you're there as a friend.
4 And like I said before, you provide me with facts, and that's what
5 I appreciate.

6
7 You've been here for a very long time. Your knowledge is amazing
8 of what you've gone through in the last, I don't know, decade,
9 maybe, of being here.

11 **LEG. CALARCO:**
12 Sixteen years.

15 Sixteen years? So -- and it shows, Rob. So I thank you. And I
16 know that having you as part of our leadership team, you're going
17 to continue making this County even a better place for the

21 And before I ask for any other nominations, I just want to add that
22 Rob has been a good friend, but, most importantly, a true partner.
23 He is a critical component of our leadership team, and, you know,
24 someone I feel I couldn't do the job without. And, certainly, I'm
25 proud to support him for his renomination this year.

27 Is there any other nominations? Are there any other nominations?
28 Yes.

31 Yes, Mr. Presiding Officer. It's my pleasure to put into
32 nomination for the office of Deputy Presiding Officer Legislator
33 Tom Cilmi.

35 Tom is an experienced Legislator. He's worked tirelessly on
36 providing -- trying to provide transparency in government, and
37 especially in our budget process. He is one that works very hard
38 to try and get us out of the hole that we are in and balance our
39 budget. He continually will highlight the fact that we're running
40 a \$75 million structural deficit every year, although others may
41 make it sound as if we have a balanced budget.

43 It's personal to him. He's got, like myself, adult children who we
44 want to keep here on Long Island. We don't want to continue to
45 make it harder for them to be able to stay here and potentially
46 have the loss of our own children off Long Island because they
47 can't afford to live here, so he shares my views on that.

49 And on a personal note, when I was thinking about running for the
50 Legislature, Tom was one of the people I spoke to, and he gave me
51 honest evaluations. He was good counsel to me in whenever I had a
52 question about what I needed to know about the Legislature, and he
53 continues to be to this date.

54
55 And so Tom Cilmi is a Legislator man that we can all look forward
56 to as someone that shares our views of wanting to balance our

1 budget and make this County the type of place where all of us can
2 afford to live here.

3
4 So it is my pleasure to place in nomination the name of Legislator
5 Tom Cilmi for the office of Deputy Presiding Officer.

6
7 **P.O. GREGORY:**

13 **P.O. GREGORY:**
14 Okay. I'll recognize Legislator Trotta.

16 **LEG. TROTTA:**
17 Again, Rob Calarco, I personally go to you at times, because your
18 depth of knowledge is, I can almost say, unmatched. You're really
19 into what you do. You're very knowledgeable, and I appreciate all
20 the help you've given me over the years. However, there's a
21 fundamental difference here and it's about taxing and spending.
22 You cannot tax your way or figure your way out of this, and that's
23 basically the difference between the two parties here.

24
25 And I think that, you know, as Albert Einstein said, the definition
26 of insanity is repeating the same thing over and over again and
27 expecting a different result. It's not going to change. We can't
28 sell a building, we can't borrow from the Sewer Stabilization Fund,
29 and I think Legislator Cilmi brings that point of view to the
30 public and to this Legislature. We need a different way of doing
31 things, because what we're doing, we can make -- pretend it's
32 working, but it's not working.

33
34 You know the County Executive came in here and talked about, you
35 know, the great Police Department. Well, it was us who came here
36 when I got here who said, "Look, this guy's a criminal," and here
37 he is, James Burke, on the cover of Newsday again today and
38 embarrassing this Police Department.

39
40 So Legislator Cilmi and the Republicans are something that's needed
41 now, because if it doesn't change, you know how bad it is this
42 year, just wait until next year. And I think that Tom brings a
43 unique perspective and we need change now, and that's why I fully
44 support him.

45
46 **P.O. GREGORY:**

1 **LEG. BARRAGA:**

2 I'd like to say one or two words with reference to supporting Tom
3 Cilmi for this particular post, and yet, Mr. Calarco I think has
4 done a fine job, and I supported you last year.

5
6 My own opinion is that Suffolk County has reached a fork in the
7 road. We either start making some definitive decisions with
8 reference to how we spend money and how we pay for it, or else
9 we're going to go down the road of good intentions, but face
10 financial control boards and bankruptcy.

11
12 Tom Cilmi, my impression of him in the last five or six years that
13 he's been here is that he's an individual that gets into the
14 nitty-gritty of the budgetary process, who really takes the time to
15 not only take and look at the major issues, but the minor ones as
16 well. He's an individual who works seven days a week, 24 hours a
17 day, not only dealing with Legislative issues, but with his
18 constituents. He realizes, as most of us do, that the financial
19 makeup of Suffolk County now is dire and it's not getting any
20 better.

21
22 When we sit here and we approve budgets and we put in spending, we
23 have to have enough courage to also vote for the revenues to pay
24 for those expenses. When we do, so be it, let the chips fall where
25 they may. When those who vote for budgets like that don't want to
26 support the revenues, then I think that's a bit hypocritical. It's
27 like the fellow who debates for a pay raise and he's dead set
28 against it, but he can't wait to get down there and pick it up.

29
30 So, you know, there are many, especially with reference to Newsday,
31 that editorialize all the time about the plight of different
32 counties, of Suffolk County, and how we have to control spending
33 and get control of our deficits. Well, that certainly is true, and
34 I think the best approach is to have someone like Tom Cilmi in the
35 Deputy position who takes the time to do the nitty-gritty hard work
36 of this Legislature with reference to the budget. You know, we're
37 talking about a fund of \$2.8 billion. And things have to be looked
38 at a lot closer.

39
40 Some of us had problems with the original budget from the Executive
41 branch, because we felt it wasn't aggressive enough in reducing
42 that spending and controlling those expenses, and I think Tom Cilmi
43 was in that perspective. But most of the time a County Executive
44 is going to get 98% of what he asks for anyway. The problem we
45 have is sometimes at the Legislature we want to be less aggressive
46 in reducing expenses, we want to keep all the good programs in
47 there. I mean, who wants to cut child care? Who wants to cut
48 domestic violence issues? Who wants to cut a whole host of issues?
49 We have 580 different nonmandated programs, we don't want to cut
50 any of them. So if you put an additional 33 million in there, then
51 you have to have enough courage to turn around and vote for the
52 revenues to pay for that 33 million, otherwise you blow a big hole
53 in the Legislature, otherwise you increase the structural deficit,
54 otherwise you increase the overall three-year deficit to better
55 than \$400 million.

1 And Tom Cilmi is the kind of person who will get into the
2 nitty-gritty of all of this and do a heck of a job. So I'm happy
3 to second his nomination for Deputy Presiding Officer.

4
5 **P.O. GREGORY:**
6 Okay. I will make a motion to close nominations, second by

1 In listening to the debate over this position, I heard some very
2 fine words about my colleague, Legislator Cilmi, and I think Tom is
3 a terrific Legislator. And I remember when he first started in the
4 Legislature and I was still just an Aide sitting behind him, in
5 leaning over to one of the other Aides when he was debating a bill
6 and saying, "You know what, he's really good." So I have a lot of
7 respect for Legislator Cilmi, and actually appreciate having the
8 opportunity to sit next to him. Unlike other levels of government
9 where you have different sides of the aisle and don't sit next to
10 each other, we sit next to each other here, and having the
11 opportunity to dialogue with Tom during the course of a meeting and
12 we chat a bit. I get to hear his perspective and his points of
13 views on things, and it certainly helps me, I think, become a
14 better Legislator and better Deputy Presiding Officer.

15
16 **LEG. CILMI:**

17 Thank you.

18
19 **D.P.O. CALARCO:**

20 So over the last year I've tried to understand and fulfill what the
21 expectations of a Deputy Presiding Officer are. I mean, the
22 obvious is, you know, to run the meetings when the Presiding
23 Officer has to step away. But there's a lot more to it than just
24 that. At times it's being counsel to the Presiding Officer, to
25 DuWayne. And as he said, I think we have a great partnership, and
26 that he has done a terrific job as our Presiding Officer. And, you
27 know, sometimes, it's simply just to be his counsel to, you know,
28 hash out an issue or a problem and help come up with the best
29 solution and the best way forward for us as a body and for the
30 County as a whole. At times, it's to be a sounding board to bounce
31 ideas off and to help refine those ideas for my colleagues. And
32 then once those are refined in the policy proposal, it's often to
33 help champion those issues with you to help make sure that they are
34 enacted into law, and to help make sure that each and every one of
35 you are getting the resources that you need for your districts.

36
37 At times I find I'm a liaison between different members, and often
38 between the Legislature and the Executive Branch. And in that
39 role, you know, I set aside my own personal feelings to make sure
40 that I'm accurately portraying the position of my colleagues and
41 the consensus of the body or the Administration to each and every
42 one of us, so we have that clear representation of what each
43 other's points of views are, and then try to work from there to
44 build consensus and compromise so that we can move forward. And
45 this isn't to say that I don't make my opinions clear, because I
46 think I certainly do. And we have certainly championed some
47 policies such as Open Data Policy, the action, the lawsuit action
48 against pharmaceutical companies for their role in our opioid
49 epidemic, and to -- for the encouragement of the creation of
50 affordable housing. And on each of these and other issues, I've
51 always tried to find common ground with each and every one of you
52 to make sure that as we move forward, it is in a fashion that as
53 many of us can get behind as possible, while at the same time
54 respecting when people have a different opinion from mine.

55
56 And I'm honored to be given the opportunity to continue in this

1 role, and I hope that I am able to continue to meet those goals.
2 And I'm always open to concerns and criticisms at times, because I
3 think that each and every one of us can always learn and improve in
4 what we do.

5
6 I look forward to working in another year with Presiding Officer
7 Gregory and all of you to do the People's business, to find ways to
8 innovate and make Suffolk County government more effective and
9 efficient in delivering vital services to the residents of this
10 County, so they feel and know that they're receiving real value for
11 their tax dollars. So thank you all again for your support.

9 **LEG. LINDSAY:**

10 No, she wants to say something.

11
12 **P.O. GREGORY:**

13 Oh, motion by Legislator Calarco, I'll second. Okay. Anyone? I
14 thought someone had -- I thought you had a comment.

15
16 **LEG. ANKER:**

17 On the motion.

18
19 **P.O. GREGORY:**

20 Oh, okay. Yeah, on the motion.

21
22 **LEG. ANKER:**

23 I just want to state for the record I will not be supporting any
24 type of politically related publication, because we're using
25 taxpayer money, we're using government money. And we're always
26 warned, whether you're a politician, elected official or public
27 servant, you don't mix the two, you never mix the two. I
28 understand there's a New York State Law declaring this to be
29 constitutional. However, I don't feel that this is the right thing
30 to do, so I will not be supporting the newspapers.

31
32 **P.O. GREGORY:**

33 Okay. All right. Oh, Legislator Lindsay.

34
35 **LEG. LINDSAY:**

36 I'll also be voting against this measure, measure 7, 8 and -- I'm
37 sorry, measure 8, 9 and 10. I just -- given the financial
38 constraints that we're under, and we constantly talk about it
39 ad nauseam here, but it's -- this is roughly a half a million
40 dollars that we just spend that is not necessary, given the
41 technologies today. I know that it's -- it's legislatively
42 necessary, but we need to change the law, that this could easily be
43 posted on the internet, which it already is, and that is where most
44 of the people get this information to begin with. To be doing it
45 the same way we've -- it's been done for hundreds of years just
46 doesn't make any sense with the new technology that we have in
47 place, and to spend a half a million dollars to do is just --
48 further makes it unconceivable, given the financial constraints
49 that we're faced. So I will be voting against this as well.

50
51 **P.O. GREGORY:**

52 Legislator Hahn.

53
54 **LEG. HAHN:**

55 I'm going to agree with the two former speakers here. I know that
56 our former Clerk really had worked hard to get things online, as is

1 the current Clerk, to make sure that we're very accessible to the
2 public. And I think that we need to meet with our State
3 Legislative leaders and, you know, make it clear that this is not a
4 necessary financial burden that we need. So, you know, I'm
5 supportive of efforts to doing that. So thank you.

6
7 **P.O. GREGORY:**
8 Legislator Trotta.

9
10 **LEG. TROTТА:**
11 I just have a question to Counsel. What happens if we don't vote
12 for this?

13
14 **MR. NOLAN:**
15 I would say that, you know, there's a legal obligation to publish a
16 lot of our legal notices. That obligation doesn't go away. So I
17 believe we would use the -- whoever was designated at the end of
18 2016 as the official newspaper. I think we have to keep publishing
19 in those papers until we, you know, redesignate new papers for
20 2017, because we have -- you know, there's --

21
22 **LEG. TROTТА:**
23 So the law requires that we have to do this.

24
25 **MR. NOLAN:**
26 We have to have papers to publish our notices in.

27
28 **LEG. TROTТА:**
29 Unfunded mandate, is that what it's called?

30
31 **MR. NOLAN:**
32 I'll let you characterize it, Legislator Trotta. It's just it's
33 the law, and the State -- that's a State Law, and we have to have
34 papers and we've get to publish our notices.

35
36 **LEG. TROTТА:**
37 So I don't -- you know, we're still going to spend the money no
38 matter what, is what you're saying?

39
40 **MR. NOLAN:**
41 I think we have to.

42
43 **LEG. TROTТА:**
44 Okay.

45
46 **P.O. GREGORY:**
47 All right. I understand people's concerns about the process, but
48 this is the process. We're legally required to advertise. To vote
49 against the process without having an alternative and a substitute,
50 in my mind, would be malpractice, because we wouldn't be able to do
51 anything, the Local Laws that we -- you know, that we sponsor and
52 legislate. You know, this body and the business of Suffolk County
53 would literally come to a halt, then we can't do the budgets. I
54 mean, this is important. Yes, Legislator Hahn.

1 **LEG. HAHN:**

2 Yeah, I just want to clarify. I agree that we shouldn't be
3 spending this money, but we have to. So, you know, I will be
4 voting for it, but I think that we should meet with our State
5 representatives and we should find a way to make sure Albany knows
6 that this is not necessary in this day and age. And in many ways
7 they need to come out of the Dark Ages and this is one of them.
8 This is absolutely not necessary. To be required to do so, you
9 know, again, is, I agree, an unfunded mandate. So I just want to
10 make that clear, that I'll be voting for it, but we should meet
11 with our State elected officials and talk about this seriously.
12

13 **P.O. GREGORY:**

14 Right. And Legislator McCaffrey and I, before the meeting today,
15 we spoke briefly about how we can work together in the coming year,
16 and going up to Albany to lobby or advocate, if you will, on issues
17 that are critically important to us, like sales tax enforcement and
18 things of that nature. And, certainly, if there's bipartisan
19 agreement on this issue, we can certainly add that to the agenda.
20 But to vote against something that, you know, is literally, you
21 know, cutting your nose off to spite your face, I mean, there --
22 you know, we can't function without advertising by law. So to not
23 have an alternative is just irresponsible. I think Legislator
24 Cilmi, and then Legislator Krupski.
25

26 **LEG. CILMI:**

27 Thanks Mr. Chair. I just really had a question, and I'm not
28 necessarily opposed to these bills. I think to some extent there
29 are some folks who aren't connected to the internet and don't get
30 their news that way, and there are some folks who actually look
31 through, I've come to find, these postings in the printed
32 newspapers and get their information. For the life of me, I can't
33 imagine somebody doing that, but, nevertheless, I'm told that
34 people actually do that.
35

36 My question, though, is this: If it's, in fact, necessary to do,
37 how is it that we get around that requirement when occasionally,
38 and admittedly it is very seldom, but occasionally we post notices
39 of public hearings on, you know, 8 1/2-by-11 sheets of papers on
40 our doors and consider that legal notice? I guess that's the
41 question I would have for Counsel.
42

43 **MR. NOLAN:**

44 Well, a lot of this, what's required to be published in newspapers
45 and what's not is determined really sometimes by State Law, and
46 sometimes by our County Law and the Charter. The tax liens, that's
47 in the Suffolk County Tax Act, that we have to publish those in our
48 official newspapers. In terms of meeting notices, the Open
49 Meetings Law states that you cannot achieve notice by posting on
50 doors of public buildings and giving a notice to the media. You
51 don't have to publish in a newspaper your meetings to be compliant
52 with the law. So it just depends. It's all throughout State and
53 Local Law in terms of what has to be advertised in the official
54 newspapers of the County.
55
56

1 **LEG. CILMI:**

2 Okay. So there are some components of the business of this body
3 that are required by State Law to be published in the newspaper?
4

5 **MR. NOLAN:**

6 Like, I believe, like our Charter requires like Local Laws to be
7 published before they're voted on, that there has to be a notice of
8 a Public -- Notice of Public Hearing has to be published in the
9 official newspapers. It's chock-full. You know, you go through
10 our Local Laws and the State Law and there's certain things that
11 have to be published in newspapers to have legal notice to the
12 public. Some things we don't, some things we do. But like, for
13 example, the tax liens are the perfect example, those have to be
14 published in our official newspapers. That's in the Suffolk County
15 Tax Act.
16

17 **LEG. CILMI:**

18 Okay, thank you.
19

20 **P.O. GREGORY:**

21 Legislator Krupski.
22

23 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

24 Thank you. So while I appreciate the concerns of some of my
25 colleagues about, you know, spending money, there are people, I
26 know I represent people who don't have internet access and so I --
27

28 **LEG. HAHN:**

29 We could mail it to them.
30

31 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

32 I would like to.
33

34 **LEG. FLEMING:**

35 To each individual person?
36

37 **LEG. KRUPSKI:**

38 Public notice is extremely important. And if we operate in a
39 vacuum, we're not going to serve our constituency very well. And I
40 got to give, you know, the Presiding Officer credit. A couple of
41 years ago he wanted to put cameras in our -- for our meetings and
42 to let people have more access to how we operate. And I think -- I
43 think it's important. I think it's important to reach out to the
44 people that we represent, because we're really serving those
45 people. If anybody can come up with a less costlier way of doing
46 it, that is efficient and that you're reaching your constituency, I
47 think I'd be happy to discuss that. But, in the mean time, this is
48 the way we're doing it and I'll support it.
49

50 **P.O. GREGORY:**

51 Legislator Hahn.
52

53 **LEG. HAHN:**

54 No, I agree. There are fewer and fewer people who are not
55 connected to the internet, but there are a number that are not, and
56 I think that they can be reached. We can have our listings printed

1 and, you know, posted in public libraries. They could be posted in
2 each of our district offices. They could be posted in every, you
3 know, County elected official's office. I think there are ways we
4 can think of that cost a lot less than what it costs to print it in
5 a newspaper that not everybody has access to. And so if we are
6 really about access, then we would be printing in a paper, in
7 papers that are required to reach every town, every village in the
8 County, and that is not a requirement.

10 And so I think that -- I think there are ways -- this is a serious
11 issue, and I think that it deserves, you know, full discussion
12 about the best way to reach those individuals who are not connected
13 to the internet, and the way that is most efficient. And there may
14 be folks who -- there may be few enough people who can't get to a
15 library, who can't get to a Legislative office, who can't get to
16 a whatever. Maybe it could be faxed, maybe it could be mailed to
17 them. You know, I think that it's worthy of discussion, because
18 this is a tremendous expense that needs to be rethought.

23 **LEG. MARTINEZ:**

24 Thank you. Just quickly, I'm not sure who may know this answer,
25 but who gets these papers? Because I know that my constituency
26 does not even get anything and they have to pay for it. So I would
27 actually like to know how are they distributed, and who decides
28 who's going to get them, and who decides what goes in it, because I
29 actually don't have those answers.

32 Yeah. I would just say that to be -- to qualify to be an official
33 newspaper, there are certain minimum requirements in the State Law,
34 which off the top of my head I can't bring to you, but I have a
35 memo in my office that would explain that. There's a minimum
36 circulation. And in State Law, it also states that the official
37 newspapers would adhere to the principles of the two major
38 political parties, Democratic and Republican. So that's right in
39 State Law. So one of these resolutions talks of Democratic
40 newspapers, and one Republican newspapers, and it's been that way
41 since time immemorial.

43 **D.P.O. CALARCO:**

44 I think, too, that I remember us having quite a debate over one of
45 the papers quite a few years back. And I believe the papers are
46 also required to be a subscription-based paper, that people are
47 actually subscribing to and paying for these papers. They can't be
48 just free distributions.

49
50 **MR. NOLAN:**

51 Right.

52
53 **D.P.O. CALARCO:**

54 That's part of the State Law.

1 **MR. NOLAN:**
2 They have to have a minimum amount of paid subscriptions in order
3 to qualify as an official newspaper. And you're right, one of the
4 papers that we're designating today we had a debate about, and we
5 concluded that they met the minimum requirements for the official
6 newspaper and they were designated.
7
8 **P.O. GREGORY:**
9 Okay. Anyone else? All right. So we have a motion and a second.
10 All in favor? Opposed?
11
12 **LEG. ANKER:**
13 (Raised hand)

15 **LEG. LINDSAY:**
16 (Raised hand)

53 Second.
